STATEWIDE CURRENT SITUATION: The Governor of Texas declared a state of disaster in Austin, Bandera, Bastrop, Brazoria, Brazos, Burlinson, Coleman, Colorado, Erath, Fayette, Fort Bend, Grimes, Hidalgo, Hood, Jasper, Kleberg, Lee, Leon, Liberty, Lubbock, Montgomery, Palo Pinto, Parker, Polk, Robertson, San Jacinto, Tyler, Walker, Waller, Washington and Wharton Counties.


The storm system which has been affecting the area has relocated to a position near Midland this morning. Deep moisture ahead of this low exists over Texas and Western Louisiana. This weather pattern will be favorable for additional rainfall the rest of the week.

The moisture did combine with one upper air disturbance the past 24 hours to produce widespread showers and thunderstorms over a good part of Texas. Thundershowers continue over Central, East Central and Southeast Texas. Scattered areas received in excess of 3.00 inches of rain the past 24 hours, with heaviest amounts of 6.50 inches noted over Houston and northward to The Woodlands. Areas of Southeast Texas received five inches of rain, and one spot near Lubbock received nearly five inches as did the San Antonio region.

The upper low near Midland will move very slowly into Central Texas. This will result in more showers and thunderstorms primarily from Northern into Eastern Texas as well as along and near the Red River into southern Oklahoma. Some locations will receive locally heavy rainfall.

The upper air low pressure system is forecast to remain stationary over Central Texas Friday morning. The overall weather pattern created by the low in this position system is conducive for additional rainfall across especially the eastern half of Texas Friday. More showers and

thunderstorms are expected with locally heavy rainfall possible, with the best chances being along and near the upper Texas Gulf coast.




Significant River Flood Outlook

River Basins:

San Jacinto Basin: Major Flooding – Widespread flooding continues across the San Jacinto river basin. Most locations have crested.

Trinity Basin: Major Flooding – Widespread moderate to major flooding continues in the lower Trinity River basin. Heavy rainfall is also forecast to occur over Southeast Texas over the next several days. This will result in additional flooding for the lower Trinity River basin.

Recent rainfall has also caused rises on the upper and middle Trinity. Several of these locations are in minor flood with a couple in the moderate flood stage levels. Flood control reservoirs have also reduced their releases to help mitigate downstream impacts due to flooding.

Brazos Basin: Major Flooding – Moderate to major flood conditions are occurring in the Brazos River basin. The record crest on the lower end of the Brazos mainstem has passed through Hempstead (HPDT2) and San Felipe (BAWT2). The forecast point at Richmond (RMOT2) is in a long broad crest from routed flow, but local rains are causing a potential uptick in the crest. This will be monitored very closely. Downstream, near Rosharon (ROST2), the river is now around 1 foot above major flood stage and is forecast to rise another foot. West Columbia (WCBT2) may reach flood stage over the weekend.

Upstream, in the upper Brazos River another significant flood wave is occurring above Lake Whitney due to excessive rainfall yesterday. Moderate flooding is ongoing on the Brazos River near Dennis (DNNT2) and near Glen Rose (GLRT2). Water supply reservoirs are generally full and soils are abnormally wet, so further rainfall has the potential to cause more significant flooding throughout the Brazos River basin.

San Antonio Basin: Major Flooding – High flows are occurring in several parts of the basin due to rain events over the past few days. A very heavy rain event has occurred in the Elmendorf (ELMT2) area to possibly drive the reach into major flood levels.

Guadalupe Basin: Moderate Flooding – Canyon Lake has been releasing about 5000 CFS for a few days generating higher flows downstream. Operations changed overnight to lower releases to assist a downstream power plant lower a gate. Releases will increase again this evening to 5000 CFS.

Flooding will fluctuate around moderate flood levels from Cuero (CUET2) downstream through Victoria (VICT2) and Bloomington (DUPT2) from routed waters.

Nueces Basin: Moderate Flooding – Moderate flooding has recently occurred on the Frio River near Derby (DBYT2) and is again expected to rise back into moderate levels later this week. Other locations are experiencing higher flows from ongoing convective activity.

Neches Basin: Moderate Flooding – Widespread minor to moderate flooding continues in the Neches river basin.

Region 1 (Includes DDCs 4 Hurst, 4 Garland, 5 Mt. Pleasant, 6 Tyler, and 22 Sherman)

DDC 4A-Hurst (Includes Denton, Erath, Hood, Johnson, Palo Pinto, Parker, Somervell, Tarrant and Wise Counties) – DDC 4A-Hurst is at Level III (Increased Readiness). Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM) District Coordinator (DC) 11/23 Waco is currently working at the Hood County Emergency Operations Center (EOC). Erath, Hood and Parker County EOC's are active.

Hood County: Homes and businesses and a church have flooded in Granbury. Hood County Office of Emergency Management (OEM) has requested assistance from the American Red Cross (ARC) in establishing a shelter. High-profile vehicles have been requested and Texas Taskforce 2 (TX-TF2) Type IV Water Rescue Team.

The Brazos River Authority conducted an emergency release from Lake Granbury and as a result Hood County has issued a mandatory evacuation for portions of the Pecan Plantation subdivision.

In the City of Granbury there is continued flooding. The third gate at Possum Kingdom Lake will be opened and increase water flow to Lake Granbury potentially prolonging flooding. In the Pecan Plantation Community, an evacuation is planned if Lake Granbury increases release above 50,000 cfs from the combination of Possum Kingdom opening a 3rd gate and 3.00 – 5.00 inches of rain in the Lake Granbury basin.

Major flooding in Acton and deCordova (Fall Creek) areas of Hood County/Granbury. Two to three feet of water is in homes and water rescues are underway. Local and State assets are on scene assessing and SAR, as required. Shelter remains available as needed. Transportation of evacuees is being arranged, if required.

Johnson County: Three inches of rain resulted in over 30 road closures within one hour requiring multiple high profile vehicles (HPV) rescues in the northern half of the county.

Parker County: Parker County submitted a Disaster Declaration on 05/31/16. In Horseshoe Bend, an active evacuation will be put in place within the next 24-36 hours due to the gate being opened. Below Dennis Gage the current height is at 28.8' and holding until 06/02/16 before dropping. Two general population shelters are open, one in Granbury and one in Weatherford.

DDC 4 – Garland (Includes: Collin, Dallas, Ellis, Hunt, Kaufman, Navarro and Rockwall Counties)

Kaufman County: A road has been washed out at the Hickory Tree Bridge in College Mound, emergency management crew are assessing the situation. The Hickory Tree Bridge is the only way into the community causing 12 homes to be inaccessible. College Mound Fire Department (FD) evacuated the homes and set up temporary shelter at the College Mound FD Station. Two water rescues were conducted; one at County Road (CR) 313 and one at Farm to Market (FM) 460.

Region 2 (Includes DDCs 13, 14, 15, 16 Houston, 16 Texas City, 16 Conroe and DDC Pierce)

DDC 13 – Bryan (Includes Brazos, Burleson, Grimes, Leon, Madison, Robertson, and Washington Counties) DDC Bryan remains activated at Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions). Multiple road closures throughout the district.

Brazos County: Brazos County Emergency Operations Center (EOC) readiness is at Level II (Escalated Response Conditions) and the City of Bryan readiness is at Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions). One road remains closed with culvert damage.

DDC 14 – Lufkin (Includes: Shelby, Nacogdoches, Houston, Angelina, San Augustine, Sabine, Trinity, San Jacinto, Polk, Tyler, Jasper and Newton Counties)

Tyler County: Due to continued significant rainfall in the Neches Basin above Town Bluff and sustained high rates of inflow occurring, the flood gates at Town Bluff Dam have been raised to

60 feet as of 4:00 PM on 06/02/16. An estimated release of 31,000 cfs., with an expected continued increase of one foot every 10 minutes until the rise in lake elevation ceases. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers will continue to closely monitor the situation and provide updates as they become available.

DDC 16 – Houston (Includes Chambers and Harris Counties)

Harris County: The Harris County Office of Homeland Security & Emergency Management (HCOHSEM): As of 0800 on 06/02/16, the Harris County EOC has moved to Level III Increased Readiness and continues to monitor rainfall in Southeast Texas.

Current forecasts indicate that some intensification is possible, leading to excessive rainfall. Grounds are completely saturated and, in many areas, swollen watersheds may be unable to tolerate additional runoff. This pattern is expected to persist over the next 60 hours.

The National Weather Service has issued multiple flood related warnings and partners should expect changes. Earlier predictions of 3-5 inches of rainfall with some areas receiving 8-12 inches still apply.

Cypress Creek: the creek rose overbanks overnight from Stuebner Airline downstream to the Spring Creek confluence and remains near bankfull or overbanks east o Heavy rainfall continues to fall across Harris County and Southeast Texas. The Harris County Office of Homeland Security & Emergency Management (HCOHSEM) has moved to Level III – Increased Readiness in response to the potential threat of extensive flooding over the next several days.

The Harris County Flood Control District (HCFCD) is closely monitoring watershed in the area. At this time, HCFCD indicates that many creeks, bayous, and rivers may go out of banks with only moderate amounts of rainfall. Here is the watershed report:

Spring Creek: creek is near bankfull at IH 45 and slowly falling, but heavy rainfall across middle Spring Creek will likely result in additional rises this morning.

Updates will be issued as needed. Additional heavy rain falling on the watershed currently will likely begin a new rise on the creek this morning.

West Fork of the San Jacinto River: The River has returned into major flood levels as run-off from Spring and Cypress Creeks moves downstream. Several subdivisions have become cut-off on both the north and south sides of the river.

Brazos River: the river crested overnight at Richmond at 54.78 ft. and has slowly fallen to 54.72ft as of 06/02/16 morning. Massive flooding continues across many areas of Fort Bend and Brazoria Counties near the river with several roads closed and subdivisions cut off.

DDC 16 – Pierce (Includes: Austin, Colorado, Fort Bend, Matagorda and Wharton Counties)

Sections of FM 1093 and US 59 are closed. Fort Bend EOC at Level I; DDC 16 Pierce has increased its readiness level to Level I and embedded in Fort Bend EOC. The mandatory evacuation order issued by the city of Wharton is for a small portion of city that is prone to flooding; ARC is working the shelter at the local Boys and Girls Club. TX-TF1 is in Fort Bend

County with five swift water rescue squads, one Type 4 US&R team and one water rescue manager; LNO assigned to DDC 16 at Fort bend

Missouri City filed disaster declaration, and the city of Richmond is working on protecting infrastructure. ARC has shelters with population of 10. ARC ordered cleanup kits for Simonton. Pierce DDC is increasing its readiness Level to Level I Maximum Readiness effective at 0700 on 06/02/16 and will be located at 5505 Avenue N. Rosenberg 77471.

Fort Bend County: City of Missouri City submitted a Disaster Declaration on 05/30/16. The EOC activated to Level I with a Full Activation on 05/30/16 due to rising water levels in the Brazos River. A voluntary evacuation order was issued on 05/29/16 for the following portions of the City: Lake Olympia Subdivisions – Flamingo Island, Jade Island, Swan Isle, Lake Olympia Streets – Chappell Lane, Peninsulas Drive, Woodlake Lane, Quail Valley Streets – Boca Court, Covey Trail, Kiamesha Drive, Tamarisk Lane, Thunderbird Street. City of Simonton and Valley Lodge issued a mandatory evacuation on 05/28/16.

City of Rosenberg submitted a Disaster Declaration on 05/29/16. A mandatory evacuation was issued on 05/29/16 due to flooding along the Brazos River. Residents of the following areas were ordered to evacuate: North side of the railroad tracks between FM 723, the Brazos River, and 8th Street; all properties north of Avenue B and east of 5th Street, bounded by 8th Street on the eastern side. All properties north of River Road adjacent to the river; and all properties south of Baker Road adjacent to the river. Evacuations for Rosenberg, North of the Brazos River to the Pecan Grove levee. Massive flooding of the floodplain across Fort Bend and Brazoria Counties is expected with flow breaching the watershed divide south of Sugar Land and pouring into Oyster Creek. Significant back water flooding along tributaries in Fort Bend and Brazoria Counties is likely. Southern Baptists Of Texas Convention is making preparations to deploy assets to support the base camp at Rosenberg: four shower units (total capacity of 23 shower stalls); one laundry unit (eight washers and eight dryers) and six volunteers to staff the units.

Wharton County: The City of Wharton and Wharton County submitted a Disaster Declaration. Wharton County submitted a Disaster Summary Outline on 05/30/16.

DDC 16 – Texas City (Includes: Brazoria and Galveston Counties) – DDC 16 – Texas City is co-located at the Brazoria County EOC.

Brazoria County: The County EOC is at Level II. The County filed a Disaster Declaration with the cities of Angleton and West Columbia. Officials were evaluating high water profile vehicle needs. Water was rising on FM 1462. A phone bank is open for the public at the EOC. Fairgrounds were prepped for livestock, but grounds are almost at capacity; opening two additional animal shelters. Shelters are open in Lake Jackson and Angleton and Rosharon is preparing to open a shelter. A planning meeting was held Monday morning to discuss what additional resources are needed.

City of Lake Jackson: The Brazos River is forecasted to crest at nearly 54 feet at the Rosharon Gauge this coming Thursday. This is substantially higher than the 51.7 feet experienced in the 1991/1992 flood. Residents living along Oyster Creek were asked to remove all loose items below the high bank and move them to higher ground. City crews pre-positioned pumps at key locations along Oyster Creek. The main effects of this flood will be felt by late this coming week.

Brazoria County submitted a Disaster Declaration on 05/31/16.

The Brazoria County Judge issued a mandatory evacuation order for residents east of the Brazos River off of Farm-to-Market (FM) 1462 and west of Oyster Creek off of FM 1462. Residents North and South of FM 1462 are in the evacuation zone.

Region 3 (Includes DDC's 19, 20, 21, 24)

DDC 21 – Weslaco: Conducting residential and commercial damage assessments in the City of Palmview. American Electric and Power are conducting repairs to damaged power poles and lines.

Region 5 (Includes DDCs 1, 2, 3 and 7)

DDC 3 – Wichita Falls (Includes: Archer, Baylor, Clay, Cottle, Foard, Hardeman, Jack, Wichita, Wilbarger and Young Counties)

Clay County has experienced significant rainfall over night. Reports of 6-8 inches of rain have fallen in a few hours. Clay County Memorial Hospital took in water a couple of inches on the first floor.

Texas Department of Transportation is now reporting all paved roadways that were previously closed now open to traffic. Clay County has five homes flooded so far. Montague County reported conducting water rescues in the City of Bowie. FM 1806 and FM 1816 are impacted by water on the roadways. There are currently no unmet needs nor requests for State assistance at this time.

Young and Jack Counties: Young County and Jack County have a few road closures impacting travel in DDC-3 Wichita Falls. In Young County State Highway 16 is closed at Loving (Intersection Hwy 16 & Hwy 114) up to the Hwy 281 intersection South of Windthorst. FM 1769 is also closed in Young County. This is a road that connects with the portion of Hwy 16 that is closed.

DDC 7 - Abilene (Includes Brown, Callahan, Coleman, Comanche, Eastland, Fisher, Haskell, Knox, Kent, Jones, Mitchell, Nolan, Runnels, Scurry, Shackelford, Stephens, Stonewall, Taylor and Throckmorton Counties):

DDC 7 Abilene is now at Level II (Escalated Response Conditions). Texas State Guard personnel are working in the EOC supporting administrative needs.

Areas of DDC 7 – Abilene experienced widespread flood and wind damage. Several roads are underwater, and parts of US 180 and US 183 are flooded. The water plant serving Breckenridge is expected to be out for five days; working on solutions to provide safe water for impacted residents. City of Coleman EOC is activated. Some evacuations are in place in Breckenridge along the Gunsolus Creek. A STAR request was submitted for TMD personnel support. Volunteer agencies such as Salvation Army and American Red Cross have been assisting residents with food, water, and other forms of assistance. There are no new requests for assistance and no unmet needs have been identified.

Brown County: Pecan Bayou water levels are at 15', which is flood stage. Waters rose to 15.2' overnight, resulting in twenty affected businesses along Commerce Street, and two apartment complex evacuations. American Red Cross (ARC) has sheltered one individual via hotel voucher. The city has a shelter available, but no population. No injuries or fatalities have been reported and there have been no water rescues conducted. The platoon of high profile military vehicles is anticipating demobilization due to receding water.

Callahan County: Numerous roads are impassable, a number of bridges/culverts are damaged, and the additional 2" rainfall this afternoon created additional flooding issues but there are no new reports of damage. Disaster Declaration submitted on 05/31/16.

Eastland County: City of Cisco submitted a Disaster Declaration on 05/31/16. Multiple roads closed. Lake Cisco is flooding and evacuations are under way for approximately 70 residents along the north shore of Lake Cisco. A shelter is being opened at Mountain Top Church in Cisco, 1428 IH-20. High-profile vehicles are assisting from TMD and mutual-aid agencies. TPWD boats were deployed to assist, as well as a boat crew from Texas Task Force 1. City of Cisco has implemented their EAP with a watch condition due to water going over the spillway of an old concrete dam. Local officials are concerned with seepage. There is limited downstream hazard.

Stephens County: The Gonsulus (Gonzales) Creek appears to have crested below the elevation of highway bridges. Big Sandy Creek has been on the rise but does not appear to be creating additional issues. The shelters in Breckenridge are closed due to a lack of population.

Taylor County: City of Tuscola sewer pumps are struggling to keep up with the influx of water. Citizens have been asked to conserve water waste. Lake Abilene lacks 2 ½' to reach spillway.

Region 6 (Includes DDCs 11,12,17,18, 23)

DDC 11/23 – Waco (Includes: Bell, Bosque, Coryell, Falls, Freestone, Hamilton, Hill, Lampasas, Limestone, McLennan, Milam, Mills and San Saba Counties)

Coryell County: Ongoing search on Fort Hood.

DDC 12 – Austin

Hays County: Heavy rains in the area have caused rising lake levels in the eastern part of Hays County near Goforth Road and High Road. Emergency officials are preparing for possible flooding that may impact homes and property in communities near the Goforth/High Road Dam. Plum Creek Conservation District is releasing water in that area, which will likely affect the following roads: Cotton Gin, Bunton Lane, Dacy Lane, S. Plum Creek, and Gristmill. In the next few days, more emergency personnel will be in the area, including Hays County Sheriff's deputies, Hays County road crews, and emergency response personnel, including firefighters.

Travis County: LCRA has continued operation of floodgates on Mansfield Dam and Tom Miller Dam. Thus, Chief Kerr has extended the waterway restrictions through Noon Friday. The specific ban areas are Lake Austin, Lady Bird Lake and Colorado River downstream of Longhorn Dam.

DDC 17 – Victoria (Includes: Gonzales, DeWitt, Lavaca, Goliad, Jackson, Victoria and Calhoun Counties) Gonzales County: Water rescue on FM 77 near Sandies Creek. Multiple road closures due to flooding.

RESPONDING STATE AGENCIES/ORGANIZATIONS REPORTS

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD): Forty Game Warden Strike Teams are standing with 20 Boats to deploy to the Richmond/Rosenberg for possible levee over-topping and flooding. Strike Team will travel on 06/02/16 and stage in the area for possible response. TPWD Game Wardens statewide remain on standby with equipment for severe weather response. Assets include three SAR boat/crews which are available and stationed in Bastrop, Tyler and McLennan counties. One Fixed Wing Cessna and One A-Star Helicopter are available from the State Pooling Board in Austin. The Cessna is available for over flight and passenger transport and the A-Star is available for search, surveillance, passenger transport and SAR-Hoist equipped. In Brownwood there are six Game Wardens with 4x4 trucks and three flat bottom boats in the event they are needed for flooding in the event that the waters crest over the dam. Eight Game Wardens with four boats standing by in Brazoria County flooding.

A Star Helo and Cessna in Austin, can be available statewide in approximately one hour.

Texas A&M Engineering Extension Service (TEEX) Texas Task Force 1 (TX-TF1): Texas Task Force 1 has staged water rescue resources in Fort Bend, Brazoria, Travis, Brazos, Washington and Parker counties for response to requests for assistance due to flooding as a result of recent heavy rains in Southeast Texas. TX-TF1 is also providing resources to support on-going search efforts on Fort Hood.

Water Squads remain ready to respond to jurisdictional requests. Water Squads are positioned in areas known to experience flooding or for rapid response to areas where flooding may occur. Water squads have been responding to flooded areas to assist with rescues and evacuations of residents.

TX-TF1 has performed: 29 assists, 32 rescues, 856 evacuations, six victim recoveries, contacted 405 citizens sheltering in place and rescued and relocated numerous companion pets and domestic livestock.

and provide technical assistance and guidance, as requested. Currently, TCEQ has been notified of 29 public drinking water systems that have issued Boil Water Notices in the flood impacted areas. Also, several sanitary sewer overflows (SSO) were reported. TCEQ Region staff is also monitoring other discharges and will assess and respond as needed to any hazardous material incidents that may occur due to the flooding event. TCEQ is monitoring several Dams impacted by flooding.

Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS): Current Summary:

THP is currently assisting with road closures across the state as necessary. There have been no requests for assistance / no unfulfilled needs.

DPS Aviation has four rotary-wing aircraft available and three aircrews on “standby” status for assistance calls. Those aircrews are staged in Austin, Houston and San Antonio. At present, DPS Aviation has no requests for assistance / no unfulfilled needs. DPS Aircraft 100 and 148 are responding to Bell County for water rescues.

Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM): TDEM State and District Coordinators are providing resource coordination and processing requests for assistance by impacted jurisdictions.

Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS): Currently represented at the SOC. Health Service Region offices are in regular contact with local emergency managers, District Coordinators, local health departments, and regional advisory councils.

Texas Department Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC): Employment Service Program (ESP) is in support of Health and Human Service Branch Director. HHSC is on standby to support water and ice operations. Executive Leadership has been briefed on disaster event. Received 1,256 calls for 2-1-1 in reference to disaster activities. HHSC is providing 24 hour coverage to SOC. HHSC has three staff members on standby for the SOC.

Texas Military Department (TMD): TMD has activated a total of 255 personnel, 92 vehicles and eight aircraft in support of Abilene, Lubbock, Rosenberg, Granbury, Weatherford, Cleburne, Glen Rose, Brownwood, Angleton, College Station, Grand Prairie, and Austin. Eight air assets assigned; helicopters in Austin, San Antonio, Ellington Airfield, and Grand Prairie. Currently supporting TTF1/2 and DDCs 4-Hurst, 7-Abilene, 16B-Texas City, and 16D-Pierce.

Texas A&M Forest Service (TFS): Continues to staff Emergency Services Branch at the SOC filling the roles of Emergency Services Branch Director and Deputy Emergency Services Branch Director and ESF4; as well as the Critical Information Systems filling the role of two GIS Specialists to assist with map development.

TFS has sent The Lone Star State IMT (38) to Fort Bend County in anticipation of additional flooding. Non TFS IMT members six are also assisting in Fort Bend County.

TFS has sent an IMT Planning element (three non TFS IMT members and two TFS personnel) to Texas City to assist with flooding.

The TFS Task Force in Merkel (nine personnel + equipment) is assigned to Amarillo DDC to in anticipation of increased flooding.

Texas Public Utility Commission (PUC): As a result of the severe weather event currently impacting Texas, a few utilities are still experiencing outages. Customers without power as of 2:30 PM are as follows:

AEP Reports 4,500 customers without power, primarily in Cameron and Hidalgo counties;

Centerpoint reports 3,500 customers without power, primarily in Harris County.

The PUC continues to monitor the situation closely.

Texas Department of Family and Protective Services (DFPS): DFPS Regional Incident Management Teams remain on "enhanced alert" status. Welfare checks for clients, facilities and staff have been conducted and are on-going as the severe weather and heavy rain circumstances fluctuate and move around the state. DFPS R6 is very closely monitoring the situation along the Brazos River, and is in frequent contact with clients near the river. One foster family reports evacuation and damage to property from flood waters. Child Care Licensing and Residential Child Care Licensing report 19 clients affected by flood waters, with damage ranging from very minor to catastrophic. Several more report closing because of water pressure or electrical outages. DFPS continues to receive calls for assistance for Adult Protective Services clients related to the current flooding incident.

The Salvation Army (TSA): The Salvation Army Texas Division has increased its resources in the affected areas to support response efforts across Texas due to the recent severe weather.

Brazoria County – The Salvation Army of Freeport, in preparation for the forecasted flooding, has a team on stand-by to provide food, hydration and emotional and spiritual care. Two mobile feeding units and one Rapid Response Unit have been deployed to the area to support feeding and bulk distribution operations. In partnership with Mercy Chefs and county emergency management, The Salvation Army has deployed a field kitchen to the Angleton Independent School District (ISD) shelter to support feeding operations in Brazoria County. Staged a total of 300 food boxes, six pallets of water and approximately 400 clean up kits at our facility in Freeport to support response efforts. Anticipated response areas are Holiday Lakes, W. Columbia and Angleton.

Fort Bend County – The Salvation Army Houston Area Command is establishing an Incident Command Team at Houston International Corps to respond to Fort Bend County by providing food, hydration and emotional and spiritual care. Five mobile feeding units and one Rapid Response unit with crews have been deployed to the Houston Area Command to support feeding and bulk distribution efforts for the county. Anticipated response areas are Pecan Grove sub-division, Sienna Plantation sub-division and County Social Services in Rosenberg.

Brazos County – The Salvation Army of Bryan/College Station has stood down feeding operations and is on standby to support the division. Communications and coordination with City Emergency Management is still on-going.

Stephens County – The Salvation Army Texas Division delivered water, at the request of DDC Abilene, to the City of Breckenridge due to their water plant not functioning.

Washington County – Cots, blankets, water and hygiene products have been delivered

to the town of Brenham in support of shelter operations. Additional emergency supplies are in transit and direct emergency assistance will commence later this week for 200-300 affected residents.

Brown County – The Salvation Army of Brownwood provided feeding support to the Brownwood EOC/Fire Station. The Brownwood mobile feeding unit and volunteer team have been activated to support feeding operations in the affected area serving first responders and residents.

Hidalgo County – The Salvation Army of McAllen has deployed their mobile feeding unit to support first responders and affected residents with food and hydration after straight line winds affected the county.

Hood County – The Salvation Army Granbury Service Unit has 150 clean up kits ready for distribution to those affected by the recent flooding.

McLennan County – At the request of the American Red Cross, The Salvation Army Shelter has been put on standby for anticipated evacuations. At the request of Bell County Emergency Management, The Salvation Army of Waco is responding with their mobile feeding unit to Owl Creek Park on Lake Belton to provide food and hydration to search and rescue crews. All Salvation Army units across the division have been briefed of the current situation and have been placed on increased readiness. Salvation Army leadership is closely coordinating with local and state emergency management as well as our other partner agencies. Served 1,732 meals; 6,471 drinks; 7,830 snacks; 65 clean up kits; 12 tarps; and 367 volunteer hours.

The American Red Cross (ARC): The Central and Southwest Region and Texas Gulf Coast Region of the American Red Cross has been active since the beginning of the May Sever Weather outbreak providing disaster relief to residents affected by devastating flooding and tornado damage.

New developments this operational period: shelters opened in Kleberg County at the Presbyterian Pan American School, Fort Bend County at the River Pointe Church in Richmond and shelter in Mission has moved to standby status, the Liberty Community Center opened, and Springcreek Baptist Church opened in Parker County.

These shelters will be open 24 hours a day, providing a warm, dry place to stay, food, child care, supporting access and functional needs, animal care, and emotional support for area residents who are not able to remain at their homes due to storms and flooding.

Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC): Staff on standby across the state if needed. Regional resources are monitoring conditions within their response areas.

Texas Department of Aging and Disability Services (DADS): Independence Hall (ALF) in the city of Bowie experienced some water intrusion into their facility. They have now placed sand bags and plastic to prevent any further water intrusion. The mayor, the city manager, and DADS staff plan to visit the facility to check on their status. Fellows Block (ICF) in Missouri City has evacuated six residents to a Super 8 hotel.

Creekside Village (NH) in the city of Clute is preparing to evacuate 78 residents to a sister facility.

Fort Bend County has inquired about the ability of Richmond State Supported Living Center to shelter evacuees from the county with an intellectual disability and who are medically fragile. That inquiry was forwarded to the Assistant Commissioner of DADS SSLC. More information has been requested from the county before a decision can be made.

DADS will continue to monitor the status of impacted facilities in the impacted areas. There are currently no unmet needs.

Texas Department of Assistive and Rehabilitative Services (DARS): DARS continues to support SOC response operations in impacted areas for potential support to people with disabilities and functions needs support services (FNSS) resources. At this time there are no unmet needs. DARS will continue monitoring for resource and information requests.

As of Thursday, 06/02/16, the Texas Department of Criminal Justice has evacuated approximately 2600 offenders from the Stringfellow and Terrell units. All evacuated offenders are receiving hot meals, recreation, and medications. Offender evacuees with critical medical needs are being addressed. Offender releases will continue as scheduled. The Sayle unit continues to receive water from the city of Albany by the TDCJ tanker trucks. The city of Breckenridge is still under a boil water notice. The TDCJ Hughes unit is preparing 500 sandbags, with 250 being delivered to Hood County. The remainder will be stored in case they are needed. TDCJ officials are monitoring rising water levels in all affected areas to determine the need to evacuate additional units.

Railroad Commission of Texas (RRC): Austin Headquarters and nine district offices are monitoring the flood event and responding to reports received within RRC jurisdiction.
