STATEWIDE CURRENT SITUATION: The severe weather threat has begun to decrease across the State, joint efforts are beginning a transition from response to recovery, as some of the river basins begin to slowly recede.

An active weather pattern will continue, with locally heavy rain expected again through Monday, but drier weather is forecast.

Showers and thunderstorms continue to impact the southeast Texas coast Sunday morning. Rainfall amounts are averaging less than 0.50 inch per hour and this trend should continue the next 12-24 hours. Over the last 24 hours, widespread amounts of 0.25 to 0.50 inch fell across much of the West Gulf River Forecast Center (WGRFC) region, with some isolated amounts of 3.00 to 5.00 inches near the Hill Country.

For the next 24 hours, the upper level low is expected to slowly shift southward over South Texas. Thereafter, the focus for heavy rains will shift towards portions of South and Southeast Texas. Rainfall amounts of up to 1.00 inch are forecast across these areas, with some higher local amounts within the center of the upper low during the evening hours.

By Sunday morning, the upper level low is forecast to weaken a bit and open up into an upper level trough. Showers and thunderstorms will continue during that time, however widespread heavy rainfall is not expected. The heaviest rainfall will likely remain offshore. Rainfall will gradually end from northwest to southeast over Texas and western Louisiana late Sunday and Monday morning.

For next week, a ridge of high pressure is forecast to develop over New Mexico and Colorado Monday night into Tuesday. Most of the WGRFC area will have dry weather as a result. Therefore, no significant rainfall is expected next week.



River Basins:

Trinity Basin: Major Flooding – Heavy rainfall has recently occurred over parts of the upper Trinity River. The headwater area for the West Fork Trinity River at Jacksboro has crested. This

water will be passed through local water supply reservoirs, keeping downstream river levels at higher than normal flow levels.

Heavy rainfall also occurred over the middle Trinity River. Again, water is being passed through various water supply reservoirs keeping downstream river levels higher than normal. The Trinity River at Trinidad and Long Lake is currently rising and is forecast to crest at moderate flood levels.

Brazos Basin: Major Flooding – Moderate to major flood conditions are occurring in the Brazos River basin on both the upper and lower reaches. USACE flood control projects are functioning as designed. The flood wave on the lower end of the Brazos mainstream continues to slowly pass through Richmond, which is on the backside of a long broad crest from routed flow from San Felipe. Downstream, near Rosharon, the river is forecast to crest around 52.8ft.

San Antonio Basin: Major Flooding – High flows are occurring in several parts of the basin due to rain events over the past few days. Major flooding is forecast to occur at the San Antonio River at Floresville and Runge. Forecast locations in the upper part of the basin have crested and are now falling. Forecast locations in the lower part of the basin are currently rising as water is routed from upstream locations.

Guadalupe Basin: Moderate Flooding – Many sites remain in flood, with the lower Guadalupe expected to continue to rise and stay in flood through the forecast period of five days. Sandies Creek has crested and is falling but will remain in moderate flood for today. Cuero will have a very slow steady rise to a peak before a rapid fall off. This will route down to Victoria which will have a long extended crest which will keep Bloomington elevated in moderate flood near major for the entire forecast time.

San Jacinto Basin: Moderate Flooding – Flooding is beginning to subside over the San Jacinto River Basin. Most forecast locations have crested and have fallen below criteria. Moderate flooding is occurring on the West Fork San Jacinto River.

Nueces Basin: Moderate Flooding – Water is now working its way through the area after heavy rainfall in the area. The Frio River will rise into moderate from routed water from the Leona River near Uvalde. This water will be routing downstream and will drive more sites into flood outside the forecast period.

Neches Basin: Moderate Flooding – Widespread minor to moderate flooding continues in the Neches river basin.

Lavaca-Navidad Basin: Minor Flooding - The Lavaca River is currently rising with minor flood levels. The remainder of this basin remains below criteria.

Colorado Basin: Minor Flooding - Pecan Bayou crested at 5 am Sunday with the lake level at Brownwood beginning to fall. Some local rainfall around Austin caused a temporary reduction at Tom Miller resulting in no additional flooding. However, this does not mean it has receded; releases will continue as lake level continues to rise. This will keep sites downstream in elevated conditions.

Sabine Basin: Minor Flooding - Minor flooding continues at Sabine River at Deweyville, and higher than normal flows continue for several points along the basin due to recent rainfall and routed flows.

Region 1 (Includes DDCs 4 Hurst, 4 Garland, 5 Mt. Pleasant, 6 Tyler, and 22 Sherman)

DDC 4A Hurst DDC4A - Hurst is now at Level III. Texas Military Department (TMD) resources from Johnson County and Somervell County were demobilized Saturday. Resources located in Hood and Parker Counties will remain in place through at least noon Sunday.

Region 2 (Includes DDCs 13, 14, 15, 16 Houston, 16 Texas City, 16 Conroe and DDC Pierce)

DDC 13 – Bryan (Includes Brazos, Burleson, Grimes, Leon, Madison, Robertson, and Washington Counties) DDC Bryan remains activated at Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions). Multiple road closures throughout the district.

Thursday evening Bryan TxDOT coordinated with their maintenance offices to formulate three crews that to work Friday, Saturday, and Sunday in Washington County to address specific needs. Bryan TxDOT District Maintenance will work on preparing details for DDC Bryan EMCs and addressing issues. TxDOT contractors continue to work on repairs on FM 2621, BS 36, and FM 1155 in Washington County and on FM 1361 in Burleson County Saturday.

DDC 15 – Beaumont (Includes Hardin, Jefferson and Orange Counties)

Hardin County: Currently experiencing flooding due to severe weather and rising levels in the Neches River, Pine Island Bayou and Village Creek. Many local roads have standing water and several Farm-to-Market (FM) roads have been closed due to rising waters. FM 770 from SH 105 to Liberty County line and FM 1003 from FM 1293 to FM 770 are closed due to high water. Several other roadways across the county also have water in low-lying areas.

DDC 16 – Houston (Includes Chambers and Harris Counties)

Harris County: The Harris County Office of Homeland Security & Emergency Management (HCOHSEM): Harris County returned to Level IV at 8 am on Saturday and deactivated EOC operations. Staff will monitor weather conditions throughout the weekend.

DDC 16 – Pierce (Includes: Austin, Colorado, Fort Bend, Matagorda and Wharton Counties) – Fort Bend EOC at Level I; DDC 16 Pierce increased its readiness level to Level I and is located at 5505 Avenue N, Rosenberg 77471. EOCs in the cities of Missouri City, Richmond, Rosenberg, and Sugarland are at Level I. EOCs in cities of Fulshear and Simonton are at Level II; city of Stafford EOC is at Level 4; and EOCs in Thompsons and Weston Lakes are no longer activated. Two shelters remain open with 52 population.

Fort Bend County: The most recent forecast for the City of Richmond appears to show the Brazos River starting to recede from a peak elevation of 54.81'. The most recent observation is 52.2'. The forecast shows the River falling below major flood level on Tuesday, but upcoming forecasts should be closely monitored for significant changes due to forecast rainfall. The most

recent forecast for Rosharon shows a peak of 52.9' on Saturday with the River remaining above major flood level through the forecast period.

Base Camp at Fort Bend County fairgrounds is established and fully operational.

To date, there have been 777 rescues/evacuations and an estimated 4,000 homes evacuated within Fort Bend County.

DDC 16 – Texas City (Includes: Brazoria and Galveston Counties) – DDC 16 – Texas City is co-located at the Brazoria County EOC. City of Brazoria, Angleton, West Columbia, and Brazos County have submitted Disaster Declarations. Angleton Middle School is open as a shelter.

Brazoria County: The County EOC remains at Level I.

The Brazoria County Judge issued a mandatory evacuation order for residents east of the Brazos River off of Farm-to-Market (FM) 1462 and west of Oyster Creek off of FM 1462. Residents North and South of FM 1462 are in the evacuation zone.

Region 3 (Includes DDCs 19, 20, 21, 24)

DDC 20 Corpus Christi (Includes: Bee, Brooks, Duval, Jim Wells, Kenedy, Kleberg, Live Oak, Refugio and San Patricio Counties) – Shelters are open within DDC 20 Corpus Christi. Damage assessments are underway; anticipating submission of DSOs by Monday. Minor electrical outages reported.

DDC 21 – Weslaco (Includes Cameron, Hidalgo and Willacy Counties) – Officials began conducting residential and commercial damage assessments in the City of Palmview Friday. American Electric and Power is repairing or replacing damaged electrical poles. FM 494 remains closed until electrical lines are repaired. Mission has one general population shelter on standby. Rio Grande Food Bank is open and providing meals. The DDC returned to Level IV – Normal Conditions at 5:00 PM on Friday.

Region 5 (Includes DDCs 1, 2, 3 and 7)

DDC 7 - Abilene (Includes Brown, Callahan, Coleman, Comanche, Eastland, Fisher, Haskell, Knox, Kent, Jones, Mitchell, Nolan, Runnels, Scurry, Shackelford, Stephens, Stonewall, Taylor and Throckmorton Counties):

DDC 7 Abilene is now at Level III (Increased Readiness). Texas Military Department personnel are working in the EOC supporting administrative needs.

The district has seen additional rainfall in the past 24 hours but it appears to be steadily moving out of the area.

As reported yesterday, Hwy 6 north of the city of Cisco will remain closed due to a major washout and will continue to have many county roads flooded for several weeks. The continued flooding of low-water crossings has severely limited travel options and this continues to make it difficult for emergency responders and residents.

The city of Cisco has contracted for a trailered water treatment system to restore municipal water operations until the plant can be repaired. Bottled drinking water has been secured by Big Country VOAD to see them through until the temporary system is operational, around Monday or Tuesday. Officials continue to seek sources for hand sanitizer for citizens in Cisco, to help reduce the demand for water.

Brownwood EOC is at Level III and DDC7 has returned to Level III operations. The administrative support provided by Texas Military Department over the past several days was crucial to the success of the mission, and they were released Friday.

There are no reports of open shelters but several are standing by and ready to assist if needed in Eastland and Brown Counties.

The forecast crest for Pecan Bayou in Brownwood has been revised to 15.4 feet, slightly higher than the previous crest of 15.2 feet; impacts to additional properties are expected to be minimal but the high water is expected to remain until Sunday evening. Lake Leon in Eastland County has taken a major surge and is now 7.3' into flood pool; this will have a significant impact on access by lake residents and will further contribute to the impacts downstream in Comanche County.

American Red Cross and Big Country: Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster (VOAD) continue to seek opportunities to assist impacted residents.

Region 6 (Includes DDCs 11,12,17,18, 23)

DDC 11/23 – Waco (Includes: Bell, Bosque, Coryell, Falls, Freestone, Hamilton, Hill, Lampasas, Limestone, McLennan, Milam, Mills and San Saba Counties)

Coryell County: Fort Hood Officials have confirmed that all of the Soldiers that were involved in the military vehicle low-water crossing incident have been accounted for and released their identities to the public Saturday afternoon after relatives were notified.

DDC 12 – Austin (Includes: Bastrop, Blanco, Burnet, Caldwell, Fayette, Hays, Lee, Llano, Travis and Williamson Counties)

Bastrop County: Bastrop County Office of Emergency Management (OEM) continues to operate their Emergency Operation Center (EOC) at Level I. Lower Colorado River levels at Bastrop 21' at 25,000 cfs and Smithville 17' at 27,000 cfs. Bastrop County continues to monitor for road and bridge damage/closures and openings and answer hotline calls for damages.


Bastrop County requested assistance from TxDOT Engineering for Geo-Technical Services to assist the Bastrop County Engineer. Two county roads are disintegrating due to erosion from the rising river.

RESPONDING STATE AGENCIES/ORGANIZATIONS REPORTS

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD): TPWD Game Wardens statewide remain on standby with equipment for severe weather response. In Brownwood, six Game Wardens with 4x4 trucks and three flat bottom boats are on standby in the event they are needed for

response, should waters crest over the dam. Eight Game Wardens, with four boats are standing by in Brazoria County to respond to Brazos River flooding. Forty Game Warden Strike Teams with 20 boats have been deployed to the Richmond/Rosenberg area for possible levee over-topping and flooding. The Strike Team is staged at the fairgrounds in Rosenberg. Assets include nine Search and Rescue (SAR) boat/crews which are available and positioned in nine locations.

One Fixed-Wing Cessna and one A-Star Helo are available (now deployed) from the State Pooling Board in Austin. The Cessna is available for over flight and passenger transport and the A-Star is available for search, surveillance, passenger transport and is SAR-Hoist equipped.



Texas A&M Engineering Extension Service (TEEX) Texas Task Force 1 (TX-TF1): TX-TF1 has staged water rescue resources in Fort Bend, Brazoria, Travis, Brazos, Hood, Washington and Parker Counties for response to requests for assistance due to flooding as a result of recent heavy rains in Southeast Texas.

An agency representative is currently on duty at the SOC while an Operations Chief is currently on duty with the SAR Overhead Team in College Station, (home base).

Water Squads remain ready to respond to jurisdictional requests. Water Squads are positioned in areas known to experience flooding or for rapid response to areas where flooding may occur.

Water squads have been responding to flooded areas to assist with rescues and evacuations of residents.

TX-TF1 has performed: 30 Assists, 32 Rescues, 1014 Evacuations, 15 victim recoveries, contacted 525 citizens sheltering in place and rescued/relocated numerous companion pets and domestic livestock.

Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT): Overnight rain and storms have not had significant impacts to TxDOT's system with the exception of prolonging closures and delaying repairs. DriveTexas.org indicates a total of 132 roadways that are either flooded or closed due to flooding or wash-out.

Crews in Bryan will work throughout the weekend making repairs. They have created a Task Force of crews from their unaffected counties to perform work in the affected Counties. The focus of the Task Force this weekend is Washington County while contractors are making repairs in Burleson County. To date, the District's focus has been and continues to be on repairs critical to the opening of the system. Beginning Monday, two teams from the Waco District will work in the Bryan district in Washington County and other affected areas to identify and document additional repairs that are necessary, but not critical.

Southeast districts continue to monitor various river and lakes with their focus on the Brazos River and Addicks Reservoir. Crews from the Beaumont district remain in Houston in an effort to provide relief and support.

As the event comes to an end and recovery continues, crews are conducting assessments and making repairs. As they gain access to impacted areas, TxDOT Bridge Division is actively engaged in assessing bridge structures.

Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ): Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) will monitor the operational status of the public drinking water and waste water facilities in the impacted flood areas and ensure that all reporting requirements are completed and will provide technical assistance and guidance, as requested. Currently, TCEQ has been notified of 23 public drinking water systems that have issued Boil Water Notices in the flood impacted areas.

The city of Cisco's public drinking water treatment plant was completely inundated due to flood waters backed up from Hwy 6. The city has issued a Boil Water Notice. They have been approved for an emergency interconnect. The city expects to have the interconnection complete by Saturday.

Also, several sanitary sewer overflows (SSOs) were reported. TCEQ Region staff is also monitoring other discharges and will assess and respond as needed to any hazardous material incidents that may occur due to the flooding event. TCEQ continues to monitor several dams impacted by flooding.

Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS): Current Summary: Currently assisting with road closures across the state as necessary. DPS Aviation has four rotary-wing aircraft available and three aircrews on "standby" status for assistance calls. Those aircrews are staged in Austin, Houston and San Antonio.

Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM): TDEM State and District Coordinators are providing resource coordination and processing requests for assistance by impacted jurisdictions.

TDEM-Human Services Branch: State and voluntary organizations assigned to the Human Services Branch continue to offer a myriad of services to flood survivors and responders across Texas. Sheltering continues with 17 shelters with a combined population of 274. Medical resources, food, water, livestock support and daily Mass Care support continues to be offered and coordinated among volunteer, local, and state agencies.

Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS): DSHS is currently represented at the SOC. All Health Service Regional offices are in regular contact with local emergency managers, District Coordinators, local health departments, and regional advisory councils.

Catastrophic Medical Operations Center (CMOC) personnel are providing liaison support to DDC 16B Texas City and DDC 16D Pierce, coordinating medical operations.

An Ambulance Strike Team and Ambulance Strike Team Leader continue to support Brazoria County EOC/DDC.

The water treatment plant in the city of Cisco is out of service and hand sanitizer has been requested to reduce the demand for water. Hand sanitizer will be delivered to Cisco.

Bariatric cots have been delivered to Angleton for use by shelter residents.

Tetanus medication will be provided to Walker County and Montgomery County.

Texas Department Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC): HHSC Emergency Services Program (ESP) continues to support SOC Human Services Branch and response operations in affected areas for Individual Assistance. HHSC Regional Administrative Services personnel have been notified to be on standby to assist TDEM Recovery on any Individual Property Damage Assessments as they occur. 2-1-1 continued to support the affected county report for the Severe Weather - May 2016 for the period of May 26th through June 3rd. 2-1-1 has included all counties affected by this severe weather event, which totals 1,816 calls. HHSC Disaster Hotline continues to receive calls from disaster applicants and clients wanting to report new damages and they are being referred back to local Emergency Management to be recorded as part of local DSOs. HHSC will continue monitoring for resource and information requests.

Texas Department of Criminal Justice (TDCJ): As of Saturday, June 4, 2016, the TDCJ has evacuated approximately 2,600 offenders from the Stringfellow and Terrell units, and has also completed the evacuation of an additional 1,700 offenders from the Ramsey Unit due to flooding of the unit's lift station. All evacuated offenders are receiving hot meals, recreation, and medications. Offender evacuees with critical medical needs are being addressed. Offender releases will continue as scheduled. The Sayle unit continues to receive drinking water from the city of Albany by TDCJ tanker trucks. TDCJ officials are monitoring rising water levels in all affected areas to determine the need to evacuate additional units with staff, offender, and public safety as the highest priority

Texas Military Department (TMD): Texas Military Department currently has 259 personnel on State Active Duty in fifteen locations across Texas. Air assets assigned are eight helicopters in Austin, Grand Prairie, Ellington Field, and San Antonio. There are a total of 57 high profile vehicles in support of Tx-TF1 and DDC 4 Hurst, DDC 7 Abilene, DDC 16 Texas City, and DDC 16 Pierce. TMD personnel continue serving as Military District Coordinators (MDCs) and as disaster district support. In the next 24 hours TMD will demobilize: one MDC in DDC 4 Hurst; two UH-60 (non-hoist) from Austin; and two DDC support teams in DDC 7 Abilene.

Texas A&M Forest Service (TFS): TFS continues to staff Emergency Services Branch at the SOC filling the roles of Emergency Services Branch Director and ESF4. TFS is also assisting Critical Information Systems in the SOC by providing one GIS Specialist to assist with map development. The Lone Star State IMT is operational in Fort Bend County and is tasked with providing management of the Base Camp and Staging Area for all pre-positioned state resources while coordinating missions through the DDC. Liaison Officers are reaching out to the surrounding affected counties, local jurisdictions, state agencies, and other resources operating within the affected area. Five personnel (2 TFS and 3 non-TFS IMT) are assisting with operations in DDC 16 Pierce. Seven personnel (3 TFS and 4 non-TFS IMT) are assisting DDC16-D in the Joint Information Center. The IMT Planning element of six personnel (3 TFS and 3 non-TFS IMT), is working at DDC 16 Texas City assisting with the incident and managing resources.

Texas Public Utility Commission (PUC): Most of the restoration efforts across the state are complete. Power outages reported by the Utilities as of 2:30PM Saturday are relatively small in number. Customers without power as of 2:30PM Saturday are as follows:

AEP reports approximately 1700 customers without power. Most of these outages are in Cameron and Hidalgo Counties.

CenterPoint reports that approximately 1600 customers, mainly in Harris County and in Fort Bend County in the Richmond and Rosenberg area are without power.

Texas Department of Family and Protective Services (DFPS): DFPS Regional Incident Management Teams remain on "enhanced alert" status. Welfare checks for clients, facilities and staff have been conducted and are on-going as the severe weather and heavy rain circumstances fluctuate and move around the state.

The Salvation Army (TSA): The Salvation Army Texas Division has increased its resources in the affected areas to support response efforts across Texas due to the recent severe weather.

Bell County – At the request of Bell County Emergency Management, The Salvation Army of Waco responded with its mobile feeding unit to Owl Creek Park on Lake Belton to provide food and hydration to search and rescue crews. All The Salvation Army units across the division have been briefed of the current situation and have been placed on increased readiness. Salvation Army Critical Incident Stress Management (CISM) personnel are ready to respond if needed. The Salvation Army leadership is closely coordinating with local and state emergency management as well as our other partner agencies.

Brazoria County – The Salvation Army of Freeport, in preparation for the forecasted flooding, has a team on stand-by to provide food, hydration and emotional and spiritual care. Two Mobile Feeding Units and one Rapid Response Unit have been deployed to the area to support feeding and bulk distribution operations.

In partnership with Mercy Chefs and county emergency management, The Salvation Army has deployed a field kitchen to the Angleton ISD Shelter to support feeding operations in Brazoria County. Truckloads of water, household food boxes, cleaning and hygiene products are being pushed into the area for distribution. Anticipated response areas are Holiday Lakes, West Columbia and Angleton.

Brazos County – The Salvation Army of Bryan/College Station has stood down feeding operations and is on standby to support the division. Communications and coordination with city emergency management is still on-going.

Brown County – The Salvation Army of Brownwood provided feeding support to the Brownwood EOC/Fire Station. The Brownwood mobile feeding unit and volunteer team have been activated to support feeding operations in the affected area serving first responders and residents.

Fort Bend County – The Salvation Army Houston Area Command is establishing an Incident Command Team at Houston International Corps to respond to Fort Bend County by providing food, hydration and emotional and spiritual care. Five mobile feeding units and One Rapid Response unit with crews have been deployed to the Houston Area Command to support feeding and bulk distribution efforts for the county. Anticipated response areas are Pecan Grove subdivision, Sienna Plantation subdivision and County Social Services in Rosenberg.

Hidalgo County – The Salvation Army of McAllen has deployed its mobile feeding unit to support first responders and affected residents with food and hydration after straight-line winds affected the county.

Hood County – The Salvation Army Granbury Service Unit has 150 clean up kits ready for distribution to those affected by the recent flooding.

McLennan County – At the request of the American Red Cross, The Salvation Army shelter has been put on standby for anticipated evacuations.

Stephens County – The Salvation Army Texas Division delivered water, at the request of DDC 7 Abilene, to the city of Breckenridge due to their water plant not functioning.

Washington County – Cots, blankets, water and hygiene products have been delivered to the town of Brenham in support of shelter operations. Additional emergency supplies are in transit and direct emergency assistance will commence later this week for 200-300 affected residents.

The American Red Cross (ARC): The Central and Southwest Region and Texas Gulf Coast Region of the American Red Cross has been active since the beginning of the May Severe Weather outbreak providing disaster relief to residents affected by devastating flooding and tornado damage.

The American Red Cross is now operating four districts for this relief operation in 29 Counties: District 1 (Austin); District 2 (Houston); District 3 (Fort Worth); and District 4 (Harlingen). Austin, Bandera, Bastrop, Brazoria, Brazos, Burleson, Cameron, Eastland, Fayette, Fort Bend, Grimes, Harris, Hays, Hidalgo, Hood, Kendall, Kleberg, Lee, Liberty, Matagorda, Montgomery, Parker, Parker, San Jacinto, Stephens, Travis, Tyler, Waller, Washington and Wharton Counties.

Shelter Operations

There are currently 17 shelters open with a population of 109 (decrease of 55 from yesterday). ARC sites continue serving as reception centers for evacuees but not all clients are staying the night. We have licensed trained health workers to assist with replacement medications and durable medical equipment at all shelter locations.

The Springcreek Baptist Church in Weatherford in Parker County closed, the Parker Lane United Methodist Church in Travis County closed, and the Bridge Street Conference Center in Granbury will be relocating the shelter to the First Christian Church in Granbury.

These shelters will be open 24 hours a day, providing a warm, dry place to stay, food, child care, supporting access and functional needs, animal care, and emotional support for area residents who are not able to remain at their homes due to storms and flooding.

Feeding Operations

The American Red Cross is partnering with the Southern Baptist Convention and Texas Baptist Men to operate three kitchens in Travis, Fort Bend, and Montgomery Counties. Feeding is being conducted by Emergency Response Vehicles (ERVs) and at fixed feeding sites at all shelters.

Bulk Distribution of Cleaning Supplies

ARC has distributed 3,815 Bulk Items, 287 Clean Up kits, and 107 Comfort Kits (toiletries).

Disaster Mental Health Services

DMH Volunteers are offering Psychological First Aid training to ground team due to disaster fatigue including anger, frustration, and hopelessness being expressed by clients as disaster conditions continue.

Damage Assessment

This operation is exploring a new app technology called "Map to Track" intended to capture damage assessment info. Teams are in the field in [District 1] Fayette, Grimes, and Washington Counties. [District 2] San Jacinto, Montgomery, Austin, Liberty, Harris. [District 3] Parker, Hood, Stevens, Brown, Eastland Counties [District 4] Hidalgo

Recovery Services

To date ARC has opened 35 cases serving 108 people.

On Saturday, the American Red Cross opened service centers to provide bulk items for cleanup, disaster health services, disaster mental health support, and recovery services to include developing personal recovery plans, identify housing resources, and sharing information on community resources and faith based assistance. Three service center locations are open June 4-5, 2016 from 9:00am-5:00pm.

Partnering with Government:

The American Red Cross is partnering with its government officials attending planning meetings at Emergency Operations Centers in affected cities, counties, and at the state level.

Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC): Continues to work livestock rescue and sheltering. Texas A&M VET arrived on Thursday and has conducted exams for hundreds of animals. Horses viewed on the news have been triaged and transported to shelters. Texas Department of Agriculture is managing a hotline and State of Texas AG relief fund.

Texas Department of Aging and Disability Services (DADS): Independence Hall (ALF) in the City of Bowie experienced some water intrusion into their facility. They have now placed sand bags and plastic to prevent any further water intrusion. The Mayor, the City Manager and DADS staff plan to visit the facility to check on their status. Fellows Block (ICF) in Missouri City has evacuated six residents to a hotel. Creekside Village (NH) in the City of Clute is preparing to evacuate 78 residents to a sister facility.

Fort Bend County has inquired about the ability of Richmond State Supported Living Center to shelter evacuees from the county with an intellectual disability and who are medically fragile. That inquiry was forwarded to the Assistant Commissioner of DADS SSLC. As of now, Richmond SSLC has not received a formal request to shelter evacuees.

Multiple long term care facilities have reported minor water intrusion at their facilities. All have been able to remedy and the water has not impacted patient care.

DADS will continue to monitor the status of impacted facilities in the impacted areas.

Texas Department of Assistive and Rehabilitative Services (DARS): DARS continues to support SOC response operations in impacted areas for potential support to people with disabilities and functions needs support services (FNSS) resources.

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service (TAES): Texas A&M AgriLife Extension agents, specialists and mid-managers have been engaged in the following actions in the past 48 hours to address flooding, strait line wind and tornado issues. Assisting local ranchers and Texas Animal Health Commission to rescue and evacuate livestock. Assisting County EOC as PIO and manning emergency telephone hotlines and phone banks. Assisting County EMC to activate companion & livestock shelters and care for rescued and evacuated animals. Providing "After A Disaster" suite of educational pubs to impacted citizens. AgriLife Communications continues to support TDEM with public information with their rural and urban mass media network connectivity. Participation on daily SOC awareness, preparedness, response and recovery Conference calls/WebEx. Participation on daily TAHC led Agriculture Industry partners and agencies conference calls. Extension mid-managers remain in contact and on standby as agency liaison to their respective Disaster District Committees. Assist USDA FSA to assess and report agricultural elated damages as a member County Emergency Board (CEB).

Railroad Commission of Texas (RRC): Austin Headquarters and nine district offices are monitoring the flood event and responding to reports received within RRC jurisdiction.

Displacement of the Magellan Pipeline has resulted in a decrease in the amount of reformulated gasoline supplied to the city of Dallas.

Per information received, the amount of product supplied by this pipeline segment (Frost to Dallas) to the City of Dallas is 80,000 barrels. Magellan is expecting to transport in, via truck, 15,000 – 20,000 barrels of reformulated gasoline to Dallas.

RRC records show one additional pipeline for refined petroleum products (exact product is unknown) operated by Explorer Pipeline.

The EPA has been contacted regarding a supply short fall and an analysis of alternate supply; it is unknown when this information may be made available.
