**STATEWIDE CURRENT SITUATION:** The general situation has improved. Although the severe weather threat continues to decrease across the State, allowing joint efforts to expand the transition from response to recovery, response resources are being retained in threatened areas. Many of the river basins are slowly receding with most expected to have crested by the end of the week. Flooding along some of the northern sections of the Leon and Trinity Rivers continue to expand which will prolong the impact to areas downstream throughout the week.

A few showers were ongoing along the southeast Texas coast Sunday morning in response to a cold front and upper trough lingering over the area. This activity is expected to continue into Monday; however precipitation amounts are expected to remain fairly low.

Rainfall will gradually ended from northwest to southeast over Texas and western Louisiana late Sunday and Monday morning.

For the coming week, a ridge of high pressure is forecast to develop over New Mexico and Colorado Monday night into Tuesday. As a result, most of the State will have dry weather through the end of the week.



## River Basins:

**Trinity Basin: Major Flooding** – The headwater area for the West Fork Trinity River at Jacksboro has crested. This water will be passed through local water supply reservoirs, keeping downstream river levels at higher than normal flow levels.

Heavy rainfall also occurred over the middle Trinity River. Again, water is being passed through various water supply reservoirs keeping downstream river levels higher than normal. The Trinity

River at Trinidad is currently cresting and Long Lake is currently rising. Both points are forecast to crest at moderate flood levels.

Major flooding is still occurring on the lower Trinity River at Liberty. The river at this location has crested and is falling. Liberty should fall below major flood by Monday.

**Brazos Basin: Major Flooding** – Moderate to major flood conditions are occurring in the Brazos River basin on both the upper and lower reaches. USACE flood control projects are functioning as designed. The flood wave on the lower end of the Brazos mainstem continues to slowly pass through Richmond, which is on the backside of a long broad crest from routed flow from San Felipe. Downstream, near Rosharon, the river has crested with a long broad crest and has started a very slow fall.

**San Antonio Basin: Major Flooding** – High flows are occurring in several parts of the basin due to rain events over the past few days. The San Antonio River at Floresville has crested at major flood stage and continues to fall in the moderate category. The San Antonio River at Runge is now cresting in the major flood category. Forecast locations in the lower part of the basin are currently rising as water is routed from upstream locations.

**Guadalupe Basin: Moderate Flooding** – Many sites are still in flood levels along the lower Guadalupe River from earlier rainfall and is expected to continue to rise and stay in flood. Sandies Creek has crested and fallen below moderate flood levels. Victoria will have a long extended crest which will keep Bloomington elevated in moderate, near major, flood through this week.

**Neches Basin: Moderate Flooding** – Widespread minor to moderate flooding continues in the Neches River Basin. Dam B at R.A. Steinhagen will be reduced from releasing 25,000 CFS to 20,000 CFS. This will reduce the impacts at Town Bluff to minor category flooding and at points below, later this week.

**Lavaca-Navidad Basin: Minor Flooding** - The Lavaca River near Edna has crested and is currently falling. River levels at this location are forecast to fall below flood stage by this evening. Higher than normal flow levels are also occurring at various locations across the Lavaca and Navidad River systems. The remainder of this basin remains below criteria.

**San Jacinto Basin: Minor Flooding** – Flooding is beginning to subside over the San Jacinto River Basin. Most forecast locations have crested and have fallen below criteria. Moderate flooding is ending this morning at the West Fork San Jacinto River near Humble, but Lake Houston is still well above its spillway and will continue to spill through the week.

**Colorado Basin: Minor Flooding** - Flooding in Brownwood from Pecan Bayou has ended this morning as the water has drained further downstream. Flood control operations continue through the Highland Lakes as well above normal inflows continue to arrive from the Llano, San Saba, and Pedernales basins. This will keep sites downstream in elevated conditions for quite awhile as they try to manage the water with minimal impacts. The only site officially above flood stage at this time is the Colorado River above La Grange.

**Sabine Basin: Minor Flooding** - Minor flooding continues at Sabine River at Deweyville, and higher than normal flows continue for several points along the basin due to recent rainfall and routed flows.

**Nueces Basin: Higher Flow Non-Flood Forecasts** – The River has started to recover from the heavy rainfall event last week. All locations are below flood stage at this time, but minor waves are still working their way down the Frio River and San Miguel Creek which is adding much needed water to Choke Canyon Reservoir.

**Region 1 (Includes DDCs 4 Hurst, 4 Garland, 5 Mt. Pleasant, 6 Tyler, and 22 Sherman)**

**DDC 4A Hurst** DDC4A - Hurst has returned to Level IV – Normal Conditions. The mandatory evacuation order issued for Hood County has been lifted. The Granbury shelters have consolidated into one location. The DDC demobilization plan has been initiated.

**Region 2 (Includes DDCs 13, 14, 15, 16 Houston, 16 Texas City, 16 Conroe and DDC Pierce)**

**DDC 13 – Bryan** (Includes Brazos, Burleson, Grimes, Leon, Madison, Robertson, and Washington Counties) DDC Bryan remains activated at Level III (Increased Readiness Conditions). Multiple road closures throughout the district.

Bryan TxDOT continues coordination with their maintenance offices to develop a plan for repairs to SH 36, and FM 1155 in Washington County and to FM 1361 in Burleson County.

**DDC 15 – Beaumont** (Includes Hardin, Jefferson and Orange Counties)

**Hardin County:** Currently experiencing flooding due to severe weather and rising levels in the Neches River, Pine Island Bayou and Village Creek. Many local roads have standing water and several Farm-to-Market (FM) roads have been closed due to rising waters. Several other local roadways across the county also have water in low-lying areas.

**DDC 16 – Houston** (Includes Chambers and Harris Counties)

**Harris County: The Harris County Office of Homeland Security & Emergency Management (HCOHSEM):** Harris County has returned to Level IV, Normal Operations.

**DDC 16 – Pierce** (Includes: Austin, Colorado, Fort Bend, Matagorda and Wharton Counties) – The Fort Bend Emergency Operations Center (EOC) remains at Level I; DDC 16 Pierce is at Level III, but has begun demobilizing. All resources have been released. EOCs in the cities of Missouri City, Richmond, Rosenberg, and Sugarland are at Level I. EOCs in cities of Fulshear and Simonton are at Level II. One shelter remains open with a population of 44. Numerous local and state roads are still closed due to high water. Multiple homes were identified as damaged throughout the DDC with over 1,200 homes evacuated.

**Fort Bend County:** The most recent forecast for the City of Richmond reports the Brazos River receding from a peak elevation of 54.81' to the most recent observation of 50.8'. The forecast shows the river falling below major flood level on Tuesday, but upcoming forecasts should be closely monitored for significant changes due to the downstream movement of flood waters. The

most recent forecast for Rosharon shows a peak of 52.3' on Monday with the River remaining above major flood level through Thursday morning.

Base Camp at Fort Bend County fairgrounds is established and fully operational.

**DDC 16 – Texas City** (Includes: Brazoria and Galveston Counties) – DDC 16 – Texas City is co-located at the Brazoria County EOC. The cities of Brazoria, Angleton, West Columbia, and Brazos County have submitted Disaster Declarations. Angleton Middle School is open as a shelter. Texas Task Force One (TX-TF1) has responded to 140 assistance and evacuation calls and 10 active rescues in the district. The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) has assisted with 67 rescues and evacuations in the district. A shelter for pets and livestock has been established at the local fairgrounds, but has reached capacity; officials are looking for options to expand the size of the animal shelter. Three general population shelters have opened in Brazoria County; one has reached capacity. Between 1,600 to 2,000 homes have been affected, over 1,000 are reported with water inside the homes. FM 521 was closed Saturday night due to high water. Water has advanced to the protection levee around Angleton.

**Brazoria County:** The County EOC remains at Level I. Flooding continues to affect Brazoria County as the Brazos River remains at major flood stage. Evacuations and rescues are ongoing and expanding in some parts of the County. The affected area will continue to grow and more evacuations are expected. Many local roadways are closed; currently, SH 35 between West Columbia and Angleton is closed. Joint response operations have expanded to include three geographical areas and numerous resources have been added to the incident. Mandatory evacuation orders have been issued for the following communities: West Rosharon, Longhorn Estates, Planter's Point, Holiday Lakes, Sun Creek Ranch and Cow Creek. A voluntary evacuation has been issued for southern Brazoria County. Evacuations in the vicinity of Holiday Lakes has affected up to 1500 residents. There were 21 persons in the Rosharon shelter, 5 in the Lake Jackson shelter and 117 in the Angleton shelter.

### **Region 3 (Includes DDCs 19, 20, 21, 24)**

Both DDC 20 Corpus Christi and DDC 21 Weslaco continue to conduct cleanup operations, specifically focused on debris management at this time.

**DDC 20 Corpus Christi** (Includes: Bee, Brooks, Duval, Jim Wells, Kenedy, Kleberg, Live Oak, Refugio and San Patricio Counties)

Damage assessments are underway; anticipating submission of DSOs by Monday. Minor electrical outages reported.

### **Region 5 (Includes DDCs 1, 2, 3 and 7)**

**DDC 7 - Abilene** (Includes Brown, Callahan, Coleman, Comanche, Eastland, Fisher, Haskell, Knox, Kent, Jones, Mitchell, Nolan, Runnels, Scurry, Shackelford, Stephens, Stonewall, Taylor and Throckmorton Counties):

Most jurisdictions in District 7 are transitioning from response to recovery and all EOCs, including DDC 7, have returned to Level 4 readiness status. Water continues to recede along Pecan Bayou. The City of Brownwood released the Texas Military Department (TMD) platoon of high profile vehicles as of 12:30pm, Sunday, June 5th.

### **Region 6 (Includes DDCs 11,12,17,18, 23)**

**DDC 11/23 – Waco** (Includes: Bell, Bosque, Coryell, Falls, Freestone, Hamilton, Hill, Lampasas, Limestone, McLennan, Milam, Mills and San Saba Counties)

DDC 11/23 – Waco continues to monitor conditions and remain engaged with local, State and federal agencies in response to expected flooding impacts.

**Bosque County:** Bosque County EOC is at Readiness Level III. Lake Whitney elevation continues to rise causing flooding in Bosque County resulting in the following road closures: SH 174 at the Brazos River (Kimball Bend) is closed and will remain closed until lake levels recede; a traffic reroute plan implemented; FM 56 northbound is restricted to local traffic only from Lakeside Village to SH 174. The following County Roads (CRs) are also closed: CR 1500 at FM 56; CR 1606 at Rocky Creek; CR 1190 near Indian Lodge; and CR 1190 near Iredell Baseball Field.

**Coryell County:** The Leon River at Gatesville is at 23.49' and is expected to rise to the moderate flood stage of 29.4' on Wednesday.

**Hamilton County:** The Leon River at Hamilton has risen to the moderate flood state at 31.31' and is expected to crest at 33.3' on Monday.

**DDC 12 – Austin** (Includes: Bastrop, Blanco, Burnet, Caldwell, Fayette, Hays, Lee, Llano, Travis and Williamson Counties)

Bastrop County requested assistance from TxDOT Engineering for Geo-Technical Services to assist the Bastrop County Engineer. Two county roads are disintegrating due to erosion from the rising river.

**DDC 17 – Victoria** (Includes Calhoun, DeWitt, Goliad, Gonzales, Jackson, Lavaca and Victoria Counties)

**Gonzales County:** FM 1116 northbound and southbound is closed due to flooding.

**Victoria County:** FM 1685 northbound and southbound is close due to flooding.

## **RESPONDING STATE AGENCIES/ORGANIZATIONS REPORTS**

**Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD):** TPWD Game Wardens statewide remain on standby with equipment for severe weather response. 10 game wardens and five boats were redeployed from the Rosenberg, Fort Bend County area to the Angleton, Brazoria County area due to rising water in that area. Eight Game Wardens with four boats are standing by in Brazoria County for Brazos River flooding. 10 additional game wardens are deployed to Angleton/Brazoria County area to assist law enforcement (LE) with road closures. A 40 Game Warden Strike Team with 20 Boats have been deployed to the Richmond/Rosenberg area for possible levee over-topping and flooding. The Strike Team is staged at the fairgrounds in Rosenberg. Resources include nine Search and Rescue (SAR) boat/crews which are available and positioned in nine locations. One Fixed Wing Cessna and one A-Star Helo are available (now deployed) from the State Pooling Board in Austin. The Cessna is available for over flight and passenger transport and the A-Star is available for search, surveillance, passenger transport and is SAR-Hoist equipped.

**Texas A&M Engineering Extension Service (TEEX) Texas Task Force 1 (TX-TF1):** TX-TF1 has staged water rescue resources in Fort Bend, Brazoria, Travis, Brazos, Hood, Washington and Parker Counties for response to requests for assistance due to flooding as a result of recent heavy rains in Southeast Texas. TX-TF2 resources have been demobilized. An agency representative is currently on duty at the SOC. An operations chief is currently on duty with the SAR overhead team in College Station, (home base). Water Squads remain ready to respond to jurisdictional requests. Water Squads are positioned in areas known to experience flooding or for rapid response to areas where flooding may occur. Water squads have been responding to flooded areas to assist with rescues and evacuations of residents. TX-TF1 has performed: 39 assists, 36 rescues, 1,129 evacuations, 15 victim recoveries, contacted 563 residents sheltering in place and rescued/relocated numerous companion pets and domestic livestock. TX-TF1 is assessing and adjusting response to align with current threat level. TX-TF1 Water Squad No.4 demobilized from Brazos County June 5<sup>th</sup> at 8am; the other three remain deployed. One six-person Swift Water Rescue Boat Squad with capable equipment for water rescue operations demobilized on Sunday.

**Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT):** There were no significant impacts overnight; overall conditions are improving. DriveTexas.org indicates a total of 110 roadways that are either flooded or closed due to flooding or wash-out. Brownwood, Bryan, and Houston remain the most impacted areas. Emergency repair plans are being developed. Maintenance crews and contractors were in Bryan on Sunday surveying damage and performing repairs. Brazoria

County has seen an increase in high water locations. Additional barricades are enroute from Bryan to assist with road closures. TxDOT is beginning to transition to recovery mode.

**Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ):** TCEQ will monitor the operational status of the public drinking water and waste water facilities in the impacted flood areas and ensure that all reporting requirements are completed and will provide technical assistance and guidance, as requested. Currently, TCEQ has been notified of 22 public drinking water systems that have issued Boil Water Notices in the flood impacted areas. Impact officers will be reaching out to impacted counties on Monday. The city of Cisco's public drinking water treatment plant was completely inundated due to flood waters backed up from Hwy 6. The city has issued a Boil Water Notice. They have been approved for an emergency interconnect, which was completed on Saturday. A portable treatment unit was delivered to the plant on Sunday. Plant engineers expect to have the portable treatment unit online by Monday. Also, several sanitary sewer overflows (SSOs) were reported. TCEQ Regional staff is also monitoring other discharges and will assess and respond as needed to any hazardous material incidents that may occur due to the flooding event. TCEQ continues to monitor several dams impacted by flooding.

**Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS):** Currently assisting with road closures across the state as necessary. Some roads have reopened but many county roads are still impassible. DPS Aviation has four rotary-wing aircraft available and three aircrews on "standby" status for assistance calls. Those aircrews are staged in Austin, Houston and San Antonio.

**Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM):** TDEM State and District Coordinators are providing resource coordination and processing requests for assistance by impacted jurisdictions.

**TDEM-Critical Information Systems (CIS):** CIS Field Staff continue to support technical needs in the field.

**TDEM-Human Services Branch:** State and voluntary organizations assigned to the Human Services Branch continue to offer a myriad of services to flood survivors and responders across Texas. Sheltering continues with 14 shelters with a combined population of 246. Medical resources, food, water, livestock support and daily Mass Care support continues to be offered and coordinated among volunteer, local, and state agencies.

**Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS):** DSHS is currently represented at the SOC. Liaisons are still deployed in Brazoria County. All Health Service Regional offices are in regular contact with local emergency managers, District Coordinators, local health departments, and regional advisory councils. DSHS has received and is filling multiple requests for Tetanus vaccines; should be deployed by Tuesday. Catastrophic Medical Operations Center (CMOC) personnel are providing liaison support to DDC 16B Texas City, coordinating medical operations. An Ambulance Strike Team and Ambulance Strike Team Leader has been extended through June 9<sup>th</sup> to continue to support Brazoria County EOC and the DDC. Tetanus medication will be provided to Walker County and Montgomery County.

**Texas Department Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC):** HHSC Emergency Services Program (ESP) continues to support SOC Human Services Branch and response operations in affected areas for Individual Assistance. HHSC Regional Administrative Services

personnel have been notified to be on standby to assist TDEM Recovery on any Individual Property Damage Assessments as they occur. HHSC Disaster Hotline continues to receive calls from disaster applicants and clients wanting to report new damages and they are being referred back to local Emergency Management to be recorded as part of local DSOs. HHSC will continue monitoring for resource and information requests.

**Texas Department of Criminal Justice (TDCJ):** As of Sunday, June 5, 2016, TDCJ has evacuated approximately 4,300 offenders from the Stringfellow, Terrell, and Ramsey units due to flooding. All evacuated offenders are receiving hot meals, recreation, and medications. Receiving units are continuing to receive necessary supplies to accommodate the additional offenders. Additional staff have also been deployed to those units. Offender evacuees with critical medical needs are being addressed. Offender releases have continued as scheduled. TDCJ property is experiencing some level of flooding. Cattle have been moved to higher ground or alternate locations. Boats are being used to confirm the level of the water where units are inaccessible by vehicles. TDCJ officials are monitoring water levels in all affected areas. At this time, the water appears to have crested.

**Texas Military Department (TMD):** TMD currently has 259 personnel on State Active Duty in twelve locations across Texas. Air resources assigned are; three helicopters in Austin, Grand Prairie, and Ellington Field in Houston. There are a total of 57 high profile vehicles in support of DDC 4 Hurst, DDC 7 Abilene, DDC 16 Texas City, and DDC 16 Pierce. TMD personnel continue serving as Military District Coordinators (MDCs). In the last 24 hours, TMD has conducted 19 missions, with 64 residents evacuated. To date, there have been three rescues by air; 72 by ground; and 172 animals. On Sunday the following resources were demobilized: one ground transportation company in DDC 4 Hurst, one ground transportation platoon in DDC 7 Abilene, two DDC support teams in DDC 7 Abilene, one MDC in DDC 4 Hurst, two Aviation Transportation (Light) MRPs, one CH-47, two liaison officers (LNOs) Joint Air Ground Coordination and 1 Engineer LNO from Adaptive Battle Staff. TMD previously demobilized: eight TMD Planning Section Support Teams, one Military Desk Team, four TMD Logistics Section Support personnel. In the next 24 hours TMD will demobilize: two ground transportation platoons in DDC 16D Pierce

**Texas A&M Forest Service (TFS):** TFS continues to staff Emergency Services Branch at the SOC with two personnel filling the roles of Emergency Services Branch Director and ESF4. TFS is also assisting Critical Information Systems in the SOC by providing one GIS Specialist to assist with map development. The Lone Star State Incident Management Team (IMT) is operational in Fort Bend County and is tasked with providing management of the Base Camp and Staging Area for all pre-positioned state resources while coordinating missions through the DDC. Liaison Officers are reaching out to the surrounding affected counties, local jurisdictions, state agencies, and other resources operating within the affected area. Five personnel (2 TFS and 3 non-TFS IMT) are assisting with operations in DDC 16 Pierce. Seven personnel (3 TFS and 4 non-TFS IMT) are assisting DDC16-D in the Joint Information Center. The IMT Planning element of six personnel (3 TFS and 3 non-TFS IMT), is working at DDC 16 Texas City assisting with the incident and managing resources.

**Texas Public Utility Commission (PUC):** Most of the restoration efforts across the state are complete. There are no significant outages to report at this time. The PUC continues to monitor the situation closely.

**Texas Department of Family and Protective Services (DFPS):** DFPS Regional Incident Management Teams remain on "enhanced alert" status. Welfare checks for clients, facilities and staff have been conducted and are on-going as the circumstances fluctuate and move around the state.

**The Salvation Army (TSA):** TSA Texas Division has increased its resources in the affected areas to support response efforts across Texas due to the recent severe weather.

**Brazoria County –** TSA of Freeport has a team on stand-by to provide food, hydration and emotional and spiritual care. Two Mobile Feeding Units and one Rapid Response Unit have been deployed to the area to support feeding and bulk distribution operations.

In partnership with Mercy Chefs and county emergency management, The Salvation Army has deployed a field kitchen to the Angleton ISD Shelter to support feeding operations in Brazoria County. Truckloads of water, household food boxes, cleaning and hygiene products are being pushed into the area for distribution. Anticipated response areas are Holiday Lakes, West Columbia and Angleton.

**Fort Bend County –** TSA Houston Area Command is establishing an Incident Command Team at Houston International Corps to respond to Fort Bend County by providing food, hydration and emotional and spiritual care. Five mobile feeding units and One Rapid Response unit with crews have been deployed to the Houston Area Command to support feeding and bulk distribution efforts for the county. Anticipated response areas are Pecan Grove subdivision, Sienna Plantation subdivision and County Social Services in Rosenberg.

**The American Red Cross (ARC):** The Central and Southwest Region and Texas Gulf Coast Region of the ARC have been active since the beginning of the May Severe Weather outbreak providing disaster relief to residents affected by devastating flooding and tornado damage. The ARC is now operating four districts for this relief operation in 29 Counties: District 1 (Austin); District 2 (Houston); District 3 (Fort Worth); and District 4 (Harlingen); which include: Austin, Bandera, Bastrop, Brazoria, Brazos, Burleson, Cameron, Eastland, Fayette, Fort Bend, Grimes, Harris, Hays, Hidalgo, Hood, Kendall, Kleberg, Lee, Liberty, Matagorda, Montgomery, Parker, San Jacinto, Stephens, Travis, Tyler, Waller, Washington, and Wharton counties.

**Shelter Operations:** As of midnight 04/05 JUN 2016 there were currently 21 shelters open with a population of 394. ARC sites continue to serve as reception centers for evacuees but not all clients are staying the night. ARC has licensed trained health workers to assist with the replacement of medications and durable medical equipment at all shelter locations. These shelters will be open 24 hours a day, providing a warm, dry place to stay, food, child care, supporting access and functional needs, animal care, and emotional support for area residents who are not able to remain at their homes.

**Feeding Operations:** ARC is partnering with the Southern Baptist Convention and Texas Baptist Men to operate three kitchens in Travis, Fort Bend, and Montgomery Counties. Feeding is being conducted by Emergency Response Vehicles (ERVs) and at fixed feeding sites at all shelters. Meals Served: 3105. Snacks: 3990.

**Bulk Distribution of Cleaning Supplies:** ARC has distributed 6,529 Bulk Items, 263 Clean Up kits, and 121 Comfort Kits (toiletries).

**Disaster Mental Health Services:** DMH Volunteers are offering Psychological First Aid training to ground team due to disaster fatigue including anger, frustration, and hopelessness being expressed by clients as disaster conditions continue.

**Damage Assessment:** This operation is exploring a new app technology called “Map to Track” intended to capture damage assessment info. Teams are in the field today in [District 1] Fayette, Grimes, and Washington Counties. [District 2] San Jacinto, Montgomery, Austin, Liberty, Harris. [District 3] Parker, Hood, Stevens, Brown, Eastland Counties [District 4] Hidalgo

**Recovery Services:** To date ARC has opened 91 cases serving 294 people. ARC is operating service centers to provide bulk items for cleanup, disaster health services, disaster mental health support, and recovery services to include developing personal recovery plans, identify housing resources, and sharing information on community resources and faith based assistance.

ARC South and Central Texas Region are assisting families affected by recent flooding events by conducting casework and distributing clean-up supplies in Bryan/College Station. Services will be provided Monday, June 6th from 10.00 am to 7.00 pm at the Red Cross chapter office in Bryan.

**Partnering with Government:** ARC is partnering with government officials attending planning meetings at Emergency Operations Centers in affected cities, counties, and at the state level.

**Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC):** Continues to work livestock rescue and sheltering. Texas A&M VET has conducted exams for hundreds of animals. Horses viewed on the news have been triaged and transported to shelters. Texas Department of Agriculture is managing a hotline and State of Texas AG relief fund.

**Texas Department of Aging and Disability Services (DADS):** Independence Hall (ALF) in the City of Bowie experienced some water intrusion into their facility. They have now placed sand bags and plastic to prevent any further water intrusion. The Mayor, the City Manager and DADS staff plan to visit the facility to check on their status. Fellows Block (ICF) in Missouri City has evacuated six residents to a hotel. Creekside Village (NH) in the City of Clute is preparing to evacuate 78 residents to a sister facility.

Fort Bend County has inquired about the ability of Richmond State Supported Living Center to shelter evacuees from the county with an intellectual disability and who are medically fragile. That inquiry was forwarded to the Assistant Commissioner of DADS SSLC. As of now, Richmond SSLC has not received a formal request to shelter evacuees.

Multiple long term care facilities have reported minor water intrusion at their facilities. All have been able to remedy and the water has not impacted patient care.

DADS will continue to monitor the status of impacted facilities in the impacted areas.

**Texas Department of Assistive and Rehabilitative Services (DARS):** DARS continues to support SOC response operations in impacted areas for potential support to people with disabilities and functions needs support services (FNSS) resources.

**Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service (TAES):** TAES agents, specialists and mid-managers have been engaged in the following actions in the past 24 hours to address flooding, straight-line wind and tornado issues. Assisting local ranchers and Texas Animal Health Commission to rescue and evacuate livestock. Continue assisting County EOC as PIO and manning emergency telephone hotlines and phone banks. Assisting County EMC to activate companion & livestock shelters and care for rescued and evacuated animals. Providing "After A Disaster" suite of educational pubs to impacted citizens. AgriLife Communications continues to support TDEM with public information with their rural and urban mass media network connectivity. Continue participation on daily SOC awareness, preparedness, response and recovery Conference calls/WebEx. Participation on daily TAHC led Agriculture Industry partners and agencies conference calls. Extension mid-managers remain in contact and on standby as agency liaison to their respective Disaster District Committees. Assist USDA FSA to assess and report agricultural related damages as a member County Emergency Board (CEB). Activate and Mobilize a CEA Ag Strike Team to Brazoria County Fair Grounds assist with animal shelters and a Livestock Supply Point.

**Railroad Commission of Texas (RRC):** Austin Headquarters and nine district offices are monitoring the flood event and responding to reports received within RRC jurisdiction.

**Texas Civil Air Patrol (TXCAP):** TXCAP conducted fly-overs on Saturday, collecting thousands of pictures along the Brazos River in Fort Bend and Brazoria Counties. Since Monday, CAP has collected over 9,000 photos. Four aircrews conducted flights on Sunday over the Lower Brazos River area. Testing of new enhanced flood analysis products are being used along the Brazos River and coastal area. All data and phots are available online.
