Key Points

Today

- Areas of heavy rain/flash flooding possible over NM.
- Excessive heat warnings in effect for N LA and central AR.
- Heat Advisories are in effect for portions of E TX/OK and AR/LA.

Friday through Monday

- Heat index values of 105+ degrees through Sunday over ern parts of FEMA Region 6.
- Scattered afternoon showers and thunderstorms each day.
- Widespread severe weather and/or flooding is not expected, but periods of heavy rain/flash flooding will remain a possibility over NM.


Tropical Outlook

- Hurricane Earl made landfall this morning near Belize City, Belize.
- Has been downgraded to a Tropical Storm now.
 - Impacts: No impacts to FEMA Region 6.

River Flood Status/5 Day Forecast Rainfall

No significant river flooding is occurring or expected.

Daily rainfall over NM may lead to some flash flooding, but river flooding is not expected at this time. No significant rainfall/flooding expected elsewhere.



Hurricane Earl made landfall this morning in Belize and will continue to move west as a Tropical Storm. No direct impacts to FEMA Region 6.








