



Domestic marijuana eradication eliminates 760,000 plants in 2001

More than 760,000 marijuana plants growing in Texas were eradicated in 2001 by DPS officers, the Texas Air National Guard, the Drug Enforcement Administration and local law enforcement agencies. Most plants were growing wild, but 48,700 others were cultivated outdoors or indoors by marijuana traffickers. DPS investigations into marijuana cultivation (indoor and outdoor) resulted in the arrests of 160 people and the seizure of 77 firearms.

The domestic marijuana eradication (DME) program has operated in Texas since 1987.

Domestic marijuana eradication by the DPS, the Air National Guard, local law enforcement agencies and the DEA has helped make Texas a safer place. This is a program that shows definite, immediate results. Many burglaries and other crimes are directly related to drugs and drug use.

The DEA provides operational, financial and technical assistance to the program.

Awards

Antonio Salinas Jr., Alberto Leroy Moya, Rolando Moya and Robert Espericueta all received Director's Awards for their actions immediately following the collapse of the Queen Isabella Causeway in September. The four were fishing close to the bridge and were the first to respond to the scene. Immediately calling 911, they used flashlights, spotlights and flares to warn oncoming motorists. Their quick action saved the lives of three crash victims and countless others who might have otherwise plunged into the waters of the Intercoastal Canal. The four fishermen pulled the three survivors out of the water and administered first aid before transporting them to the Coast Guard Station. They were nominated by Sgt. Raul Vargas, HP Brownsville, and Sgt. Rolando Castaneda, Texas Rangers Company D Brownsville.

The entire crew of the U.S. Coast Guard Cutter Mallet was nominated for a Director's Award by Lt. Lynn Dixon, Training Austin, for their valuable assistance following the collapse of the Queen Isabella Causeway. The Mallet responded to the accident scene within hours of the initial collision, and the crew was conducting operations when the third section of the bridge fell. Their quick response was responsible for preventing the injury of rescue personnel. The Mallet offered its assistance as a dive platform and recovery crane, and worked with the DPS Dive Team to develop and execute recovery plans for the victims and their vehicles.

Without the help of the *Mallet* crew, the recovery operation would have been beyond the capability of the DPS dive team. The *USCGC Mallet*

New requirements set for trooper-trainee recruits

Trooper education requirements have been increased to a minimum of 75 semester hours from an accredited college or university--15 hours more than the prior minimum of 60 hours.

And while experience may still be substituted for education, DPS now requires such

applicants to have an additional six months of actual on-the-job work experience. For example, to qualify for the academy an applicant with no college credit must have at least 30 months experience in law enforcement or as a correctional officer or jailer. Applicants substituting law enforcement experience must have a high school diploma, or a GED certificate and 12 college semester hours (with a minimum 2.0 grade point average).

Applicants with 60 to 74 semester hours need only six months work experience. Substitution of military service for education increased from 24 to 30 months, and qualifies for the required 75 semester hours. Applicable work experience was amended to include employment as a correctional officer with the Texas Youth Commission.

Requirements for trooper-trainees will increase again for fiscal year 2003. Applicants will be required to have a minimum of 90 semester hours of qualifying education, and the work experience substitution ratios will increase. Military experience as a substitution for the education requirement will increase to 36 months.

Narcotics reorganization

The DPS Narcotics Service is now divided into four regions with assistant field commanders who report directly to the Narcotics Service Commander in Austin. Seven additional field captain positions also were created. The moves were made after DPS assumed operational oversight of state narcotics task forces at the request of the Governor's office. DPS will provide standardization of policies, but control of each task force will remain with local project directors and advisory boards.

Since June 11, more than 118,000 individuals or families have registered for assistance for flood damage.
