STATEWIDE CURRENT SITUATION: As a result of continued flooding caused by Tropical Depression Imelda, the State of Texas Operations Center (SOC) remains at Level II (Escalated Response Conditions) as of 0700 Thursday, September 19th.

Governor Abbott declared a State of Disaster for Brazoria, Chambers, Galveston, Hardin, Harris, Jasper, Jefferson, Liberty, Matagorda, Montgomery, Newton, Orange and San Jacinto counties on Thursday, September 19th.

Current Weather Situation:

Isolated to scattered showers and a few thunderstorms are expected over Southeast Texas today. Mostly dry weather is expected Tuesday and Wednesday. Scattered showers and thunderstorms will return from Thursday through Saturday. At this time, the probability for widespread hazardous weather is low. Flooding will continue along portions of the lower Neches River, Pine Island Bayou and Cow Bayou through the early part of the week.

OPERATIONAL PRIORITIES:

1. Protect life and property.
2. Support rapid & effective response.
3. Collect and disseminate accurate incident information to improve decision-making.
4. Accurately, track incident costs associated with assigned resources for cost recovery.

DDC 14 – Lufkin (Includes: Angelina, Houston, Jasper, Nacogdoches, Newton, Polk, Sabine, San Augustine, San Jacinto, Shelby, Trinity and Tyler Counties) – DDC 14 Lufkin activated to Level III (Increased Readiness) on 9/19/19. Jasper County issued a Disaster Declaration on 9/19/19 and a Disaster Summary update on 9/21/19. Newton County issued a Disaster Declaration on 9/19/19. San Jacinto County issued a Disaster Declaration on 9/20/19 and

submitted a Disaster Summary Outline on 9/22/19. Sabine River near Deweyville remains in minor flood stage and will continue to fall to below flood stage by this morning

DDC 15 – Beaumont (Includes: Hardin, Jefferson and Orange Counties) - The City of Beaumont submitted a Disaster Summary Outline update 2 on 9/22/19. The City of Kountze submitted a Disaster Summary Outline on 09/21/19. City of Port Arthur issued a Disaster Declaration on 9/19/19, The City in Orange submitted a Disaster Summary Outline on 9/21/19. City of Kountze submitted a Disaster Summary Outline on 9/21/19. The Neches River near Beaumont is in moderate flood stage at 7.4 feet. The river will continue to rise to near 7.9 feet by early Tuesday and then begin falling. Pine Island Bayou near Sour Lake remains in major flood stage. The river is at 33.3 feet which causes impacts to homes along Riverbend Drive in Bevil Oaks near the river. The river will continue to fall to below flood stage by Friday early afternoon Neches River at Neches River Saltwater Barrier remains in moderate flood stage and is expected to go into major flood stage. The river is at 7.9 feet and will continue to rise to near 8.5 feet by early Tuesday morning and then begin falling. At 7 feet, water begins to go over Bigner Road into the Saltwater Barrier and cuts off most access to the Four Oaks Ranch Road downstream of Four Oaks boat launch. At 8 feet, widespread flooding especially in Northwest Orange County from Lake View downstream to the Saltwater Barrier can be expected.

DDC 16A – Houston (Includes: Chambers and Harris Counties) – Interstate Highway (IH) 10 east and westbound has been re-opened at the Crosby Lynchburg Road Bridge in Harris County. The United States Coast Guard (USCG) along with the barge company removed the barge and Bridge Engineers are assessing the condition of the eastbound bridge. Harris County submitted a Disaster Summary Outline on 9/20/19. The City of Houston issued a Disaster Declaration and submitted a Letter to the Governor on 9/20/19. The City of Houston also submitted Disaster Summary Outline update 1 on 9/22/19. Chambers County submitted Disaster Summary Outline updates 1, 2, & 3 on 9/22/19.

DDC 16C – Conroe (Includes: Liberty, Montgomery, Walker and Waller Counties) – DDC 16C Conroe has activated to Level III (Increased Readiness). Walker County EOC activated to Level III (Increased Readiness) on 9/17/19. Liberty County issued a Disaster Declaration and a letter to the Governor, 9/21/19. City of Liberty issued a Disaster Declaration on 9/21/19. City of Pinehurst issued a Disaster Declaration on 9/19/19 City of Ames issued a Disaster Declaration on 9/21/19. City of Hardin issued a Disaster Declaration on 9/21/19. City of Dayton issued a Disaster Declaration on 9/21/19. City of Devers issued a Disaster Declaration on 9/21/19. Montgomery County issued a Disaster Declaration on 9/21/19. City of Conroe issued a Disaster Declaration on 9/21/19.

RESPONDING STATE AGENCIES/ORGANIZATIONS REPORTS

Texas A&M Forest Service (TFS): TFS is currently providing staffing of the SOC to support the ongoing activation. One short type-3 incident management team (IMT) assigned to the Hardin County Office of Emergency Management, one Short Type 3 Incident Management Team to Jefferson County Emergency Operations Center, and one planning module assigned to DDC 15-Beaumont. The Planning Module supporting DPS ROC in DDC 16A was demobilized. One All-Hazard Incident Management Team (AHIMT) and three chainsaw teams are also available for this incident.

Texas Intrastate Fire Mutual Aid System (TIFMAS) had nine high profile vehicles assigned to Hardin and Jefferson Counties for rescue and evacuation operations. Those resources have a combined 21 rescues, 40 evacuations, and 6 transfers to medical providers. TIFMAS has assigned one engine and one water tender to Orange County to support the City of Vidor Fire Department from flood damaged equipment with one additional engine requested today. A strike team leader is also being added and those resources. TIFMAS has three water tenders enroute to Galveston County to support firefighting missions, starting 9/22/19.

Texas A&M Task Force 1 (TX-TF1): Ongoing mission planning for additional resources with state partners. TX-TF1 released the aircraft on standby and the aircraft that were deployed were sent back to their home station but will remain activated. The two TMD platoons activated 9/19/19 were released to be reassigned to TFS in support of PODS. TX-TF1 has rescued 406 individuals, evacuated 1205 individuals and 38 animals throughout southeast Texas. Additionally TX-TF1 has conducted 535+ shelter in place checks. Search and Rescue (SAR) hoist aircraft that are deployed are being sent back to the station, but will remain activated until 1700 hours. The two TMD platoons activated 9/19/19 are being swapped with TMD high profile vehicle platoons in Winnie and Beaumont. Platoons that were relieved are being returned to TMD JOC. TX-TF1 swift water squads assisted with hay delivery in Jefferson and Chambers County. TX-TF1 swift water boat squads and TX-TF1 high profile vehicles repositioned to Gateway, their home station. SAR resources will activate in support of local requests as needed.

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service (Agrilife): AgriLife Extension deployed a strike team to support two animal shelter operations with Extension Agents in Chambers and Jefferson Counties. Two agents are assigned to Jefferson County and three agents are located in Chambers County. County Extension Agents in Orange, Montgomery, Liberty and Harris Counties are assessing needs in those counties. Extension personnel were in contact with agency partners, stakeholders, NGO partners and the TAMU VET to determine capabilities and respond to post-storm issues. Five Extension Agents have been requested to assist with windshield surveys of damage for preliminary damage numbers in Orange County.

Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM): The TDEM State Operations Center conducted a response and recovery conference call on Monday and will continue conducting conference calls as needed. The SOC remains Activated at Level III Escalated Response and continues to process and coordinate resource requests. TDEM Region 2 Assistant Chief and District Coordinators continue Response and Recovery Coordination in Region 2.

TDEM Recovery Unit: The TDEM Recovery Unit is reviewing the Disaster Summary Outlines and preparing TDEM staff to coordinate and conduct Preliminary Damage Assessments (PDAs) in the affected areas. The Disaster Support and Recovery Taskforce has rostered available personnel and are standing by to support requests from local jurisdictions that are received in the SOC.

Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC): TAHC emergency management, regional, and administrative personnel across the state continued to monitor weather and field conditions across the state. All field personnel were on stand-by status to respond to local requests in their assigned jurisdictions. TAHC regional staff were assigned to local/regional jurisdictions in support of animal issues committees and response efforts in the affected areas. TAHC representative staffed the SOC during the day-shift and on-call during the night shift to help coordinate state-wide animal issues operations. TAHC staff is in contact with local animal care and sheltering facilities and organizations to determine operational status and needs. TAHC personnel were in contact with agency partners, stakeholder, NGO partners, and various veterinary organizations to determine capabilities and respond to post-storm animal issues. Texas A&M Veterinary Emergency Team was assigned to Chambers County to treat and access the medical needs of livestock and small animals (cats and dogs) sheltering at Whites Park and Ford Park. TAHC communications department monitored social media, updated the TAHC website with information regarding livestock & small animal flooding resources, and shared this information with our agriculture partners and stakeholders. TAHC is working cooperatively with TMD, Air Operations Center (AOC), and TX-TF1 to coordinate air drops of hay to stranded cattle in Chambers and Jefferson Counties.

Regional and Central Office Staff activated to support local and DDC animal sheltering operations, as needed. Coordinating with local and regional contacts to assess availability, capability, and operational status of large animal holding facilities and animal shelters in the affected area. The animal shelter is open at Whites Park in Chambers County in support of the Red Cross shelter at the same location; the current number of animals being sheltered: 27 horses, 14 cattle, 45 dogs, and 2 cats. Ford Park in Jefferson County has opened to shelter rescued animals. The current number of animals being sheltered is 5 rescued horses. East Montgomery County Senior Center in New Caney is a human shelter, also sheltering pets. The current number of animals sheltered is 35 dogs and cats. Total livestock: 51 Total small animals: 84. All of these counties are aware of animal issues, but there is no access to where the animals are located due to extremely high water. A Texas A&M Veterinary Emergency Team (VET) has arrived at Whites Park in Chambers County. They are settling in and are accessing the situation. VET has reported that the animals sheltering at Whites Park are in good condition. A second TAMU VET team has traveled to and arrived at Ford Park in Jefferson County. At the end of the operational period, the SOC received a STAR requesting the TAMU VET team to assist at Ford Park in Jefferson County. Texas A&M AgriLife SOC rep has been coordinating with their county agents to support the animal shelters at Chambers and Jefferson Counties. Texas Department of Agriculture-Hay Hotline has been working to locate hay resources to fill incoming STAR requests. The initial delivery of 600-700 bales of hay was delivered to Whites Park on Saturday morning. An initial delivery of 24 round bales and some square bales for Jefferson County was completed yesterday. TDA is trying to locate additional hay sources to send to Ford Park. TAHC field staff worked to support the operations at Whites Park moving and preparing the hay for distribution and helicopter pickup. TAHC PIOs have updated TAHC's website with livestock and animal flooding resource information and is

monitoring social media. The assigned TAHC representative in the SOC is coordinating with TAHC representatives at the DDC level, agriculture partner organizations, NGO partners, and other stakeholders to fill STARS from affected regions.

STARS were received from both Jefferson and Chambers counties, each for (1) Chinook helicopter and support crew to assist with dropping hay for livestock in areas where they cannot be reached by roads due to flooding. STARS were approved and filled with a Mission Ready Package of (2) Chinooks and support crews staffed by (2) TX-TF1 boat squads. The Chinooks arrived and were able to complete hay drops to all four locations. TAHC SOC rep is coordinating operation details with field/county contacts, Air Ops, and TX-TF1. A shareable map with real-time data was created to record data and show operation progress.

Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ): TCEQ staff continue to contact drinking water and wastewater treatment plants to assess operational impacts. City of Rose City (Orange County) has issued a boil water notice. TCEQ HAZMAT contractors have been placed on stand-by to respond, if needed. Staff conducted air reconnaissance in the areas of the major refineries and chemical plants. Staff is assessing state superfund sites in the affected areas, as conditions permit.

Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA): TDA is facilitating the movement of hay bales to feed cattle and horses in Chambers and Jefferson County. 600 to 700 square bales of hay are coordinated for delivery to Chambers County on Saturday, 9/21. Additionally, TDA continues to search for additional hay for Ford Park in Jefferson County. Chambers County hay transport has been delivered and confirmed at 11:30 am, 9/21/19. TDA is still coordinating efforts to get more hay to Jefferson County. Currently, there is a load of hay scheduled for delivery to the Ford Park drop off this morning.

Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS): DPS, Texas Highway Patrol (THP) is currently providing staffing at the SOC in support of the ongoing activation.

Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS): There were no known impacts to ESF-8 infrastructure and no unmet needs. Emergency Medical Task Force assets are on standby for mission tasking to support the incident. DSHS is supporting the SOC during their activation due to Tropical Depression Imelda. Tdap vaccines will be delivered on Tuesday, 9/24/19 via FedEx from DSHS Central Office Pharmacy in Austin. Vaccines will be sent out on Monday and received on Tuesday. Regional Immunization Managers have confirmed they have storage and monitoring capability devices.

DSHS Texas Emergency Medical Task Force (TX EMTF): TX EMTF is currently supporting local EMS/FD with surge and or backfill, 911 coverage, evacuations, triage and transports of rescued evacuees. TX EMTF evacuated one nursing home. TX EMTF is currently supporting Hardin, Chambers, Jefferson and Orange Counties. TX EMTF conducted 54 EMS transport missions. The total patient encounters are at 196.

Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT): TxDOT is providing staffing at the SOC, monitoring this system and is prepared to assist as needed. TxDOT is actively updating drivetexas.org with road condition changes. Interstate Highway (IH) 10 is open east and westbound San Jacinto River to the Louisiana border. Some portions still have water in outer lanes and maybe reduced down to one lane. Crews continue to monitor flooded roadways and

provide traffic control and detour assistance. USCG along with the barge company removed the barge and Bridge Engineers are assessing the condition of the eastbound bridge on IH-10 at the San Jacinto River. Currently there are 15 roadways affected by high water and an additional 20 roadway closures due to flooding. TxDOT is prepared to provide barricades and cones for the PODs.

Texas Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC): The HHSC SOC Liaison is collecting, documenting and sharing situational awareness information, responding to inquiries, and monitoring state requests for HHSC-provided assets. HHSC has received nine State of Texas Assistance Request (STARs) for water/ice. Two are on hold pending further instructions. The remaining seven are being worked and have been/will be fulfilled according to requested timelines. All programs are currently monitoring this situation. ERM continues to staff the HHSC SOC Liaison position today. Night shift is not expected to activate at this time.

Three (3) truckloads of water were delivered to Galveston County 9/21/19. Ice and water trucks destined for Jefferson County are scheduled to arrive on 9/22/19 to support POD operations. Ice and water trucks destined for Orange County are scheduled 9/22/19 to support POD operations. Evacuated long term care facilities began repatriating on 9/20/19. Several individuals in the Home and Community-based Services program evacuated their homes during flooding; situation being monitored. Disaster Behavioral Health Tri-County Services (Liberty, Montgomery, & Walker Counties) are responding to mental health needs in local shelters. Agency is collecting documentation and initiating planning to apply for relevant waivers and to potentially initiate DSNAP in affected counties. HHSC is assessing damage at agency facilities.

Texas Information and Referral Network (2-1-1 TIRN): The Southeast Regional Planning Commission (SERPC) was closed 9/19/19 and 9/20/19 but plan to re-open 9/23/19, at which time the 2-1-1 TIRN Network will have returned to full operational capacity. Other 2-1-1 call centers are taking calls on behalf of SERPC. There has been virtually no impact to call volume. Other 2-1-1 call centers are taking calls on behalf of SERPC and UWGH and therefore there has been a limited to no impact. United Ways of Greater Houston (UWGH) has returned to full or near to full operational capacity. As of 9/20/19, 2-1-1 TIRN received a 14% increase in calls (an additional approximately 1,000 calls) over last Friday but average wait time to answer has only increased by approximately 20 seconds suggesting that the Network is handling the increased volume. State office remains in communication with the Network and its call specialist to ensure up-to-date, accurate and comprehensive information and referral are being provided. 9/20/19 Top Five Referrals provided: Shelters (220), Crisis Clean-Up Line (105), Rumor Control (88), Crowd Relief (60), and Disaster Relief (33). Top Five Counties calling: Harris (44%), Jefferson (31%), Montgomery (7%), Orange (5%), Liberty (5%). The 2-1-1 TIRN team is actively monitoring telephony statistics to ensure adequate Network call taking capacity and is communicating with the Network providers and call specialists. SOC Call Reminder: Emergency Management Coordinators, please continue to work with your local 2-1-1 contact to update service information and assist with addressing unmet needs.

Texas Military Department (TMD): TMD has activated 140 personnel in support of the September Severe Weather response. TMD has one Ground Transportation Company with two platoons conducting Point of Distribution commodities distribution missions in Jefferson County. Six Expedient Response Teams are assigned to operate six Points of Distribution in Jefferson and Orange Counties in support of TFS. TMD has one Military District Coordinator supporting DDC 15 and two teams supporting the State Operations Center.

Volunteer Agencies Active in Disaster (VOAD):

American Red Cross (ARC): ARC has initiated the Tropical Storm Imelda response and are staffing with leadership teams. Many ARC volunteers are ready to respond. Teams conducted volunteer call downs and have mass care teams on standby status through the state. ARC is supporting various EOCs virtually and in person. Inspecting shelter trailers across the state and crews are on standby to move when activated. Shelter trailers are stocked to support a 50-100 person shelter and are strategically stationed throughout the potentially affected area.

Fixed feeding is occurring at all shelter locations. Working with the Texas Baptist Men's to set up a kitchen in Nederland (Jefferson County). The kitchen capacity is 15,000 per day or 7,500 per meal. We are meeting with the Feeding Taskforce to have strategic planning discussions for future community feeding needs. Family reunification services are available through our Safe and Well website, <https://safeandwell.communityos.org/cms/index.php>, to date we have received 15 registrations. ARC is delivering clean up kits to Liberty County today.

Feeding Texas: Feeding Texas has five-member food banks that serve the effected counties. They are responding to their respective community needs. Feeding Texas member food banks mission is to provide food assistance to those who need it. To date food banks have distributed 25,435 pounds of food, snacks and water for disaster response above their normal distributions in Brazoria, Chambers, Harris, Liberty and Jefferson Counties. To date the Houston Food Bank has distributed 678 prepared meals in support of shelters in Chambers County.

Southern Baptists of Texas Convention (SBTC): SBTC has 14 units activated and has accumulated 310 volunteer hours.

The Salvation Army (TSA): ARC has initiated the Tropical Storm Imelda response and are staffing with leadership teams. Many ARC volunteers are ready to respond. Teams conducted volunteer call downs and have mass care teams on standby status through the state. ARC is supporting various EOCs virtually and in person. Inspecting shelter trailers across the state and crews are on standby to move when activated. Shelter trailers are stocked to support a 50-100 person shelter and are strategically stationed throughout the potentially affected area.

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The Salvation Army (TSA): TSA is monitoring the flooding occurring due to TD Imelda moving through SE Texas. They have been in contact with their Salvation Army units around the state and have put several mobile feeding units on standby in anticipation of feeding needs in the affected communities. Salvation Army facilities outside the affected area are open for evacuees looking for shelter. TSA continues to support local emergency management with resource

request and continues to coordinate with local and state VOAD partners as well as active Long Term Recovery Groups helping to identify resources for the affected community. We are also working local community organizations accepting donations and supplying cleaning and other relief supplies. We are engaged with the Texas Feeding Task Force coordination calls to identify potential gaps in feeding and to determine mobile and fixed feeding sites as volunteer groups come into the area helping to muck out homes. In Harris County, TSA of Houston, with the NW Corps feeding unit, provided meals, hydration and clean up kits to the areas of Kingwood and along Westheimer & Hampstead. Disaster Workers will continue to provide outreach to the affected communities providing meals and bulk distribution where needed. The Conroe Canteen is roving the Kingwood and surrounding areas providing hot meals to survivors and First Responders. TSA of Harris County continues to partner with local community groups providing relief supplies in the Kingwood and other surrounding areas affected by flooding.

In Hardin County, TSA provided 200 clean up kits to the City of Kountze.

In Orange County, TSA is supporting POD locations in Mauriceville and Vidor with blankets. They also provided 1,000 clean up kits and a pallet of paper towels to the Orange Disaster Assistance Group who is supporting the local community with clean up via local churches and other civic organizations. TSA of Orange continues to support the local community with food, Hydration and relief supplies as well as close coordination with Emergency Management for any unmet needs.

In Jefferson County, TSA received 100 individuals for shelter at their gym in support of county evacuations. The Beaumont gym was set up to shelter 100 individuals for Saturday night; this has now been moved to Monday. TSA of Beaumont will continue to coordinate with city and county emergency management as well as local community organizations and churches to help address unmet needs.

In Galveston County, TSA of Galveston has gone back to normal operations and stands ready to assist with mobile feeding if necessary.

In Montgomery County, TSA of Conroe continues to support the Bull Salas Community Center with daily hot meals, and continues to support affected areas distributing cleanup and relief supplies.

Service Delivery as of 9/22/19: 2,398 meals; 6,028 snacks and drinks; 1,720 clean-up kits, 500 hygiene kits and 130 food boxes.

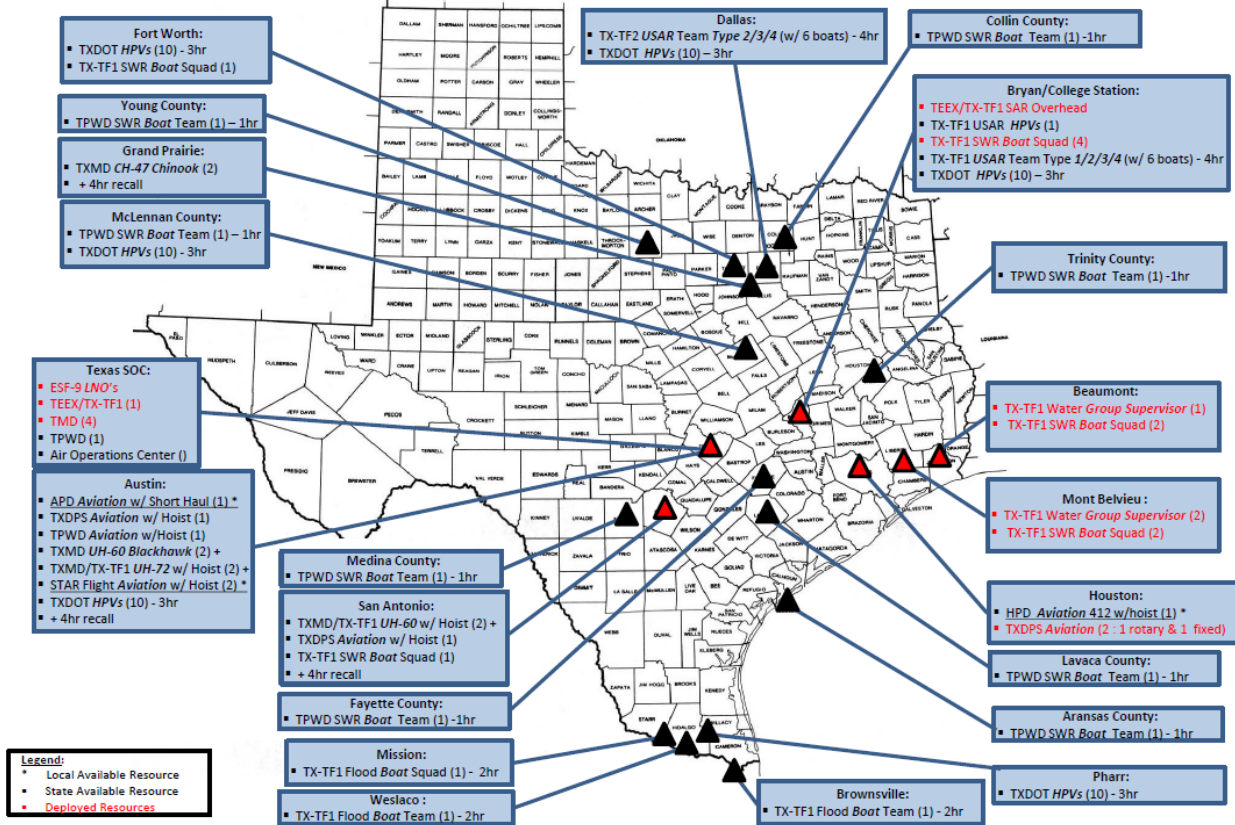
