**STATEWIDE CURRENT SITUATION:** As the incident transitions for response to recovery, the State of Texas Operations Center (SOC) decreased readiness from Level II (Escalated Response Conditions) to Level III (Increased Readiness) as of 1900 September 23<sup>rd</sup>, 2019.

Governor Abbott declared a State of Disaster for Brazoria, Chambers, Galveston, Hardin, Harris, Jasper, Jefferson, Liberty, Matagorda, Montgomery, Newton, Orange and San Jacinto counties on Thursday, September 19<sup>th</sup>.

**Current Weather Situation:** No hazardous weather is forecast in the affected areas for today. Flooding will continue along portions of the lower Neches River, Pine Island Bayou and Cow Bayou through the later part of the week.

**OPERATIONAL PRIORITIES:**

1. Protect life and property.
2. Support rapid & effective response.
3. Collect and disseminate accurate incident information to improve decision-making.
4. Accurately, track incident costs associated with assigned resources for cost recovery.

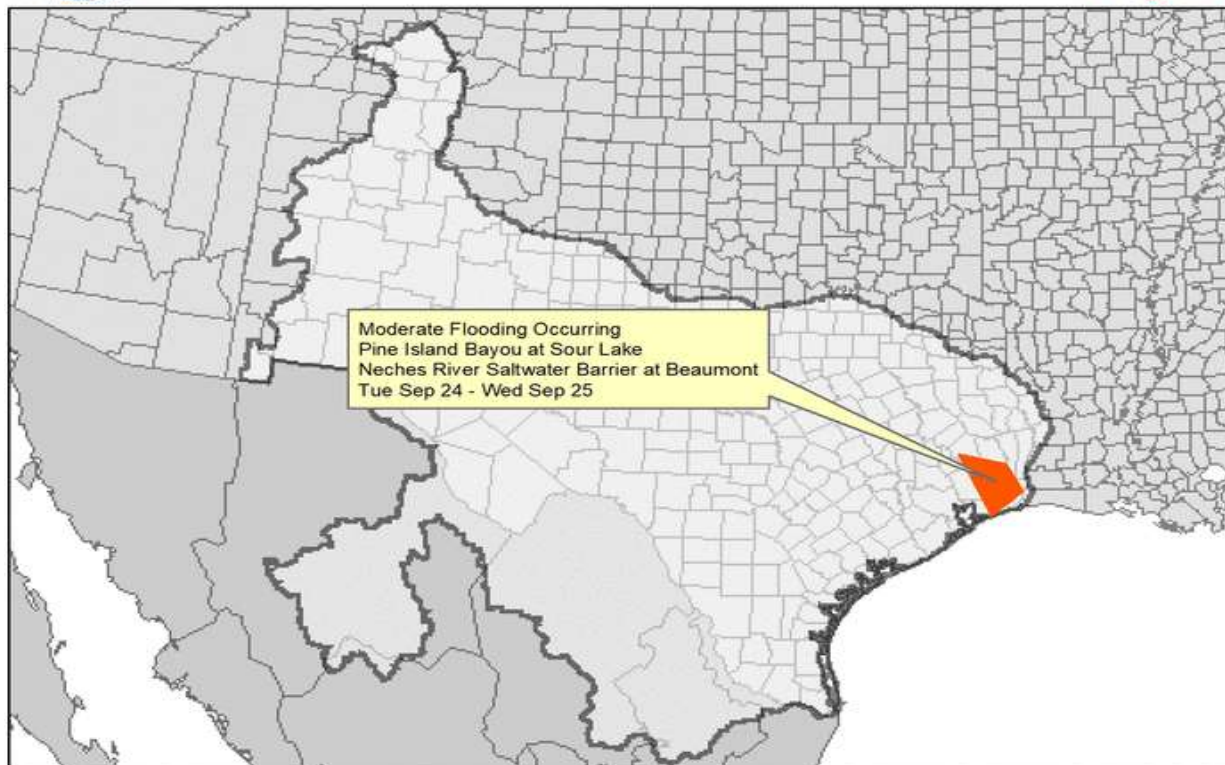


# Significant River Flood Outlook

## Region 2 (Includes DDCs 13, 14, 15, 16 Houston, 16 Texas City, 16 Conroe, and 16 Rosenberg)

**DDC 15 – Beaumont** (Includes: Hardin, Jefferson and Orange Counties) - Hardin County issued a Disaster Declaration on 9/19/19 and submitted a Disaster Summary Outline on 9/21/19. Pine Island Bayou near Sour Lake remains in moderate flood stage, at 30 feet and is expected to fall to below flood stage by Friday afternoon. Floodwaters affecting communities near Sour Lake are receding. The Neches River at Neches River Saltwater Barrier remains in moderate flood stage at 6.2 feet and is expected to fall to below flood stage by Thursday night. The City of Nederland issued a Disaster Declaration on 9/19/19. The City of Port Arthur issued a Disaster Declaration on 9/19/19. Jefferson County submitted Disaster Summary Outline update #1 on 9/22/19. The City of Beaumont submitted Disaster Summary Outline update #7 on 9/24/19. Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM) District Coordinator (DC) 20 – Corpus Christi is assisting at the Jefferson County Emergency Operations Center (EOC). Orange County issued a Disaster Declaration on 9/19/19. The City of Pinehurst issued a Disaster Declaration and submitted a letter to the Governor on 9/19/19. The City of West Orange issued a Disaster Declaration on 9/19/19. The City of Orange submitted a Disaster Summary Outline on 9/21/19. An emergency overnight curfew was issued for the city from 10

PM to 6 AM. Orange County submitted a Disaster Summary Outline on 9/23/19. The City of Pinehurst submitted a Disaster Summary Outline 9/24/19. The Cow Bayou near Mauriceville has dropped to moderate flood stage and continues receding. The Neches River near Beaumont is in minor flood stage and continues receding. DC 4A - Hurst is assisting at the Orange County EOC. DC 13 – Bryan will be demobilizing from the EOC 9/25/19.

**DDC 16A – Houston** (Includes: Chambers and Harris Counties) – Chambers County issued a Disaster Declaration on 9/18/19 and submitted a Letter to the Governor on 9/19/19. An emergency overnight curfew was issued for the City of Winnie from 10 PM to 6 AM. Chambers County submitted update #4 to their Disaster Summary Outline on 9/23/19. Harris County issued a Disaster Declaration on 9/19/19. The City of Bellaire submitted a Disaster Summary Outline on 9/19/19. Harris County submitted Disaster Summary Outline update #1 on 9/23/19. The City of Baytown submitted a Disaster Summary Outline on 9/23/19. The City of Bunker Hill Village submitted a Disaster Summary Outline on 9/23/19. IH-10 at the San Jacinto River Bridge will reopen today on the eastbound side. One lane on east bound lane will be converted to west bound traffic. The City of Houston issued a Disaster Declaration and submitted a letter to the Governor on 9/20/19. The City of Houston submitted a Disaster Summary Outline update #2 on 9/23/19.

**DDC 16B – Texas City** (Includes: Brazoria and Galveston Counties) – The City of Lake Jackson submitted a Disaster Summary Outline on 9/20/19. The City of Freeport submitted a Disaster Summary Outline on 9/20/19. The City of Angleton submitted a Disaster Summary Outline on 9/23/19. County Judge declined public/ individual assistance on 9/24/19. The City of Dickinson City issued a Disaster Declaration on 9/17/19. Galveston County issued a Disaster Declaration on 9/19/19. Galveston County submitted a Disaster Summary Outline on 9/20/19. The City of Galveston submitted a Disaster Summary Outline update #1 on 9/21/19.

**DDC 16D – Rosenberg** (Includes: Austin, Colorado, Fort Bend, Matagorda and Wharton Counties) - Matagorda County submitted a Disaster Summary Outline on 9/24/19.

## **RESPONDING STATE AGENCIES/ORGANIZATIONS REPORTS**

**Texas A&M Forest Service (TFS):** TFS is currently providing staffing of the SOC to support the ongoing activation. One short type-3 incident management team (IMT) assigned to the Hardin County Office of Emergency Management demobilized Tuesday night. One Short Type 3 IMT to Jefferson County EOC and one planning module remain assigned to DDC 15-Beaumont. One All-Hazard Incident Management Team (AHIMT) and three chainsaw teams remain available for this incident. Additionally, TFS is providing management and support for POD operations in Jefferson and Orange counties.

**Texas Intrastate Fire Mutual Aid System (TIFMAS):** TIFMAS has a Strike Team of three engines and one Strike Team Leader assigned to Hardin County for damage assessment assistance and backfill for local fire departments. All but one engine may be released on 9/24/19. Volunteer Fire Department staffing is being evaluated locally to determine how best to right size the TIFMAS response package. A TIFMAS strike team of two engines, one water tender and one Strike Team Leader is operating in Orange County to support local fire departments that have flood damaged equipment. Local resource availability is being reviewed to determine an appropriate demobilization plan. A TIFMAS strike team of three water tenders are operating on the Bolivar Peninsula in Galveston County to support firefighting missions while municipal water supplies are depleted. A TIFMAS strike team of three engines, three water tenders and one Strike Team Leader is assigned to Jefferson County to backfill for local

fire departments. The TIFMAS representative at the SOC demobilized and will work remotely to coordinate deployed resources.

**Texas A&M Task Force 1 (TX-TF1):** TX-TF1 demobilized all swift water boat squads on 9/24/19.

**Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service (Agrilife):** Agrilife has activated 16 Extension Agents to assist TDEM by making onsite observations and completing Preliminary Damage Assessment (PDA) reports for Orange, Jasper and Newton Counties. Five agency personnel continue to support the TAMU Veterinary Emergency Team at the Chambers and Jefferson Animal Shelters, as well as helping with hay distribution at animal shelters. Agrilife is standing ready to support TDEM and local jurisdictions in Jefferson, Jasper, Harris and other counties to provide PDA observations and reports as needed.

**Texas A&M Veterinarian (VET):** The Texas A&M Veterinary Emergency/Agrilife Extension Team is conducting operations in Jefferson and Chambers Counties at White’s Park and Ford Arena. The animal situation, from the perspective of veterinary medical support, appears to be stable and improving. Animal admissions that were scheduled to occur Tuesday did not materialize and aerial surveys indicate that future admissions are unlikely. Discussions with Chambers and Jefferson Counties indicate support for moving back to an operational posture aimed toward demobilization 9/25/19. The teams efforts have been focused on ensuring medical problems in sheltered animals have been appropriately resolved and on preparing vehicles for travel.

**Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM):** The TDEM State Operations Center conducted a response and recovery conference call on Tuesday and will continue conducting conference calls as needed. The SOC continues to support response and recovery coordination for impacted jurisdictions.

**TDEM Recovery Unit:** The TDEM Recovery Unit is reviewing the Disaster Summary Outlines and preparing TDEM staff to coordinate and conduct Preliminary Damage Assessments (PDAs) in the affected areas. IA / SBA Preliminary Damage Assessments began on 9/22/19. The Disaster Support and Recovery Task Force has rostered available personnel and are standing by to support requests from local jurisdictions that are received in the SOC. PDA teams started operations on Monday, 9/23/19 for Jefferson and Orange Counties. Montgomery and Chambers Counties PDAs began Tuesday, 9/24/19. Harris County PDA will begin operations on Thursday, 9/26/19.

**Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC):** TAHC emergency management, regional, and administrative personnel across the state are continuing to monitor weather and field conditions across the state. All field personnel are on stand-by status to respond to local requests in their assigned jurisdictions. TAHC regional staff is assigned to local/regional jurisdictions in support of animal issues committees and response efforts in the affected areas. TAHC representative is staffing the SOC during the day-shift to help coordinate state-wide animal issues operations. TAHC staff is in contact with local animal care and sheltering facilities and organizations to determine operational status and needs. TAHC personnel are in contact with agency partners, stakeholder, NGO partners, and various veterinary organizations to determine capabilities and respond to post-storm animal issues. Texas A&M Veterinary Emergency Teams are assigned to Chambers and Jefferson Counties to access and provide medical support of rescued livestock and small animals, sheltering at Whites Park and Ford Park. TAHC is working cooperatively with Texas A&M Agrilife and county livestock officials to deliver hay to stranded cattle in Chambers and Jefferson Counties.

The animal shelter is open at Whites Park in Chambers County in support of the ARC shelter at the same location; the current number of animals being sheltered: 23 horses, 13 cattle, 11 dogs, and 2 cats. Ford Park in Jefferson County is open to shelter rescued animals. The current number of animals being sheltered is 11 horses and 8 goats. East Montgomery County Senior Center in New Caney is a human shelter, also sheltering pets. The current number of animals sheltered pets is 35 dogs and cats. Total livestock: 55 Total small animals: 48. A Texas A&M Veterinary Emergency Team (VET) is assigned and supporting the operations at Whites Park in Chambers County and Ford Park in Jefferson County. The Texas A&M AgriLife SOC rep has been coordinating with their county agents to support the animal shelters and responding to animal issues at Chambers and Jefferson Counties. TAHC field teams are working in both Chambers and Jefferson Counties conducting assessments, as well as supporting animal shelters, TAMU VET, Agrilife, county livestock deputies and assisting with hay distribution. In Jefferson County, operations continued throughout 9/24/19 to delivery hay for stranded livestock in areas unable to be reached by owners due to flooding. During the assessment, approximately 300-400 additional head of cattle were found stranded, un-fed and still standing in water or on very limited high ground. Any injured and/or stray livestock found (that could be moved) were taken to Ford Park for VET care and sheltering. Field teams are working with owners and county officials to manage the carcasses found. In Chambers County, no airboat deliveries were requested. The water is slowly receding. Owners are able to access, care and/or move their animals via their boats or large tractors. No dead and no major issues were found. TDA and TAHC have continued working to locate hay resources to fill the STAR requests. Hay supplies are being staged at pickup points, ready for pickup and delivery. The 400 bales from TDCJ were delivered to Ford Park. This 400 in addition to the 150 received the previous evening are both partial fills of the 1400 bales requested for Jefferson County. TAHC received verbal notification that the 700 bales STAR for Chambers County will be cancelled. Hay supply donations have been exceedingly difficult to acquire. The limited availability is due to a bad hay year throughout the state. TDA and TAHC along with Ag industry organizations have worked diligently to solicit donations. We have exhausted all donation and state resources. As of 9/24/19, 750-850 bales were delivered in Chambers and Jefferson Counties.

**Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ):** TCEQ staff continues to assess any issues with drinking water and wastewater treatment plants. Staff contacted 367 wastewater treatment plants and 80 drinking water plants. Several wastewater treatment plants remains inaccessible. The City of Rose City, Harris County MUD 54, Derwood Subdivision, Crystal Forest Subdivision, Maywood Acres, Dow Freeport and Harris County MUD 21 remains under a boil water notice. Staff is on standby to assist local governments with temporary debris

management sites. TCEQ HAZMAT contractors remain on standby to respond, if needed. Eighteen orphaned containers will be picked up in Jefferson County and east Chambers County. The region is also tracking the remediation of 11 spills in the area.

**Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA):** TDA delivered 150 bales of hay to Jefferson County on 9/23/19. Texas Department of Criminal Justice (TDCJ) was able to secure 403 bales of hay and delivered them to Jefferson County on 9/24/19. Chambers County is scheduled to receive a portion of the 403 hay bales. On 9/23/19, Chambers County Sheriff's Office secured 65 bales of hay and then used an airboat, assisted in the locating and feeding of stranded livestock within Chambers County.

**Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS):** DPS, Texas Highway Patrol (THP) is currently providing staffing at the SOC in support of the ongoing activation.

**Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS):** There were no known impacts to ESF-8 infrastructure and no unmet needs. Emergency Medical Task Force assets are on standby for mission tasking to support the incident. DSHS is supporting the SOC during their activation due to Tropical Storm Imelda. Tdap vaccines were delivered on Tuesday, 9/24/19 via FedEx from DSHS Central Office Pharmacy in Austin.

**DSHS Texas Emergency Medical Task Force (TX EMTF):** TX EMTF is currently supporting local EMS/FD with surge and or backfill, 911 coverage, evacuations, triage and transports of rescued evacuees. TX EMTF is currently supporting Hardin, Jefferson and Orange Counties. TX EMTF conducted 56 EMS transport missions. The total patient encounters are at 198.

**Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT):** TxDOT is providing staffing at the SOC, monitoring this system and is prepared to assist as needed. TxDOT is actively updating drivetexas.org with road condition changes. Crews continue to monitor flooded roadways and provide traffic control and detour assistance. Crews are placing traffic control devices out to re-open IH 10 at the San Jacinto Bridge in both directions in Harris County. Currently there are six roadways affected by high water and an additional four roadway closures due to flooding. TxDOT is currently working to secure an agreement with Hardin County for debris removal assistance in their local communities.

**Texas Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC):** The HHSC SOC Liaison is collecting, documenting and sharing situational awareness information, responding to inquiries, and monitoring state requests for HHSC-provided assets. HHSC has received 15 State of Texas Assistance Request (STARs) for water/ice. All programs are currently monitoring this situation. ERM continues to staff the HHSC SOC Liaison position on day shift. Twenty-four truckloads of bottled water and eight truckloads of bagged ice have been provided in Jefferson and Orange Counties to support POD operations on 9/24/19. Disaster Behavioral Health Tri-County Services (Liberty, Montgomery, & Walker Counties) are responding to mental health needs in local shelters. HHSC is collecting documentation and initiating planning to apply for relevant waivers and to potentially initiate DSNAP in affected counties. Three HHSC staff members are supporting Individual Assistance / Small Business Administration Preliminary Damage Assessments in Montgomery, Harris and Chambers Counties.

**Texas Information and Referral Network (2-1-1 TIRN):** The 2-1-1 TIRN team is actively monitoring telephony statistics to ensure adequate Network call taking capacity and is communicating with the Network providers and call specialists.

**Texas Military Department (TMD):** TMD currently has activated 136 personnel in support of the September Severe Weather response. TMD has one Ground Transportation Company with two platoons conducting Point of Distribution commodities distribution missions in Jefferson County. Six Expedient Response Teams (EXR) are assigned to operate six Points of Distribution (POD) in Jefferson and Orange Counties in support of TFS. TMD has one Military District Coordinator supporting DDC 15 and two teams supporting the State Operations Center.

**Volunteer Agencies Active in Disaster (VOAD):**

**American Red Cross (ARC):** ARC has initiated the Tropical Storm Imelda response and are staffing with leadership teams. Many ARC volunteers are ready to respond. Teams conducted volunteer call downs and have mass care teams on standby status through the state. ARC is supporting various EOCs virtually and in person.

Fixed feeding is occurring at all shelter locations. On 9/24/19, in partnership with Texas Baptist Men (TBM), the ARC opened kitchen operations in Nederland producing 2,000 hot meals for dinner based on community needs. Mobile teams are operating in Jefferson, Montgomery and Harris Counties providing household cleaning items. There are 18 Damage Assessment Teams in Liberty, Montgomery, Harris and Orange Counties. Family reunification services are available through our Safe and Well website, <https://safeandwell.communityos.org/cms/index.php>, to date we have received 15 registrations.

**Feeding Texas:** Feeding Texas has five-member food banks that serve the effected counties. They are responding to their respective community needs.

**Southern Baptists of Texas Convention (SBTC):** SBTC has 15 units activated and has accumulated 540 volunteer hours.

**The Salvation Army (TSA):** TSA continues to coordinate with state and local emergency management across the affected areas. They are engaged with local and state VOAD partners as well as active Long-Term Recovery Groups helping to identify resources for recovery efforts. We are also working with local community organizations accepting donations and supplying cleaning and other relief supplies. TSA is engaged and coordinating with the State Feeding Task Force members to identify potential gaps in feeding and to determine mobile and fixed feedings sites as volunteer groups come into the area helping to muck out homes. TSA is continuing to coordinate with all community, state, and local partners as they support local recovery and clean-up efforts. TSA is participating in the state recovery calls as well as the Texas VOAD recovery coordination calls.

In Liberty County, TSA service unit, in coordination with local partners, has provided clean-up kits, food boxes and other relief supplies for those in affected communities.

In Chambers County, starting 9/26/19, TSA will partner with St Vincent DePaul (SVDP) providing a truck load of cleanup kits and food boxes in the City of Winnie at St. Louis Catholic Church. TSA will also have the TSA of Bryan College Station canteen onsite providing snacks and hydration.

In Harris County, TSA with the NW Corps feeding unit provided meals, hydration and clean up kits to the areas of Kingwood and along Westheimer and Hampstead. Disaster Workers will continue to provide outreach to the affected communities providing meals and bulk distribution where needed. TSA of Houston continues to reach out to affected communities providing clean-

up kits as needed. Conroe Canteen is also roving Kingwood and surrounding areas providing hot meals to survivors and First Responders.

In Orange County, TSA is supporting POD locations in Mauriceville and Vidor with blankets. They also provided 1,000 clean up kits and a pallet of paper towels to the Orange Disaster Assistance Group who is supporting the local community with clean up via local churches and other civic organizations. TSA of Orange continues to support the local community with food, hydration and relief supplies as well as close coordination with Emergency Management for any unmet needs. TSA Rapid Response Unit from DFW arrived on scene to help with distribution of food, hydration and emotional and spiritual care in the community.

In Jefferson County, TSA received 100 individuals for shelter at their gym in support of county evacuations. TSA of Beaumont will continue to support the local surrounding communities with relief supplies out of their Beaumont disaster warehouse as needed.

In Montgomery County, TSA of Conroe is coordinating with the community of Patton Village providing clean-up kits and hot meals. TSA Conroe visited the areas of Woodbranch and Roman Forrest doing assessments and providing emotional and spiritual care.

Service Delivery as of 9/24/19: 2,489 meals; 6,290 snacks and drinks; 2,774 clean-up kits, 370 food boxes and 380 infant supplies.

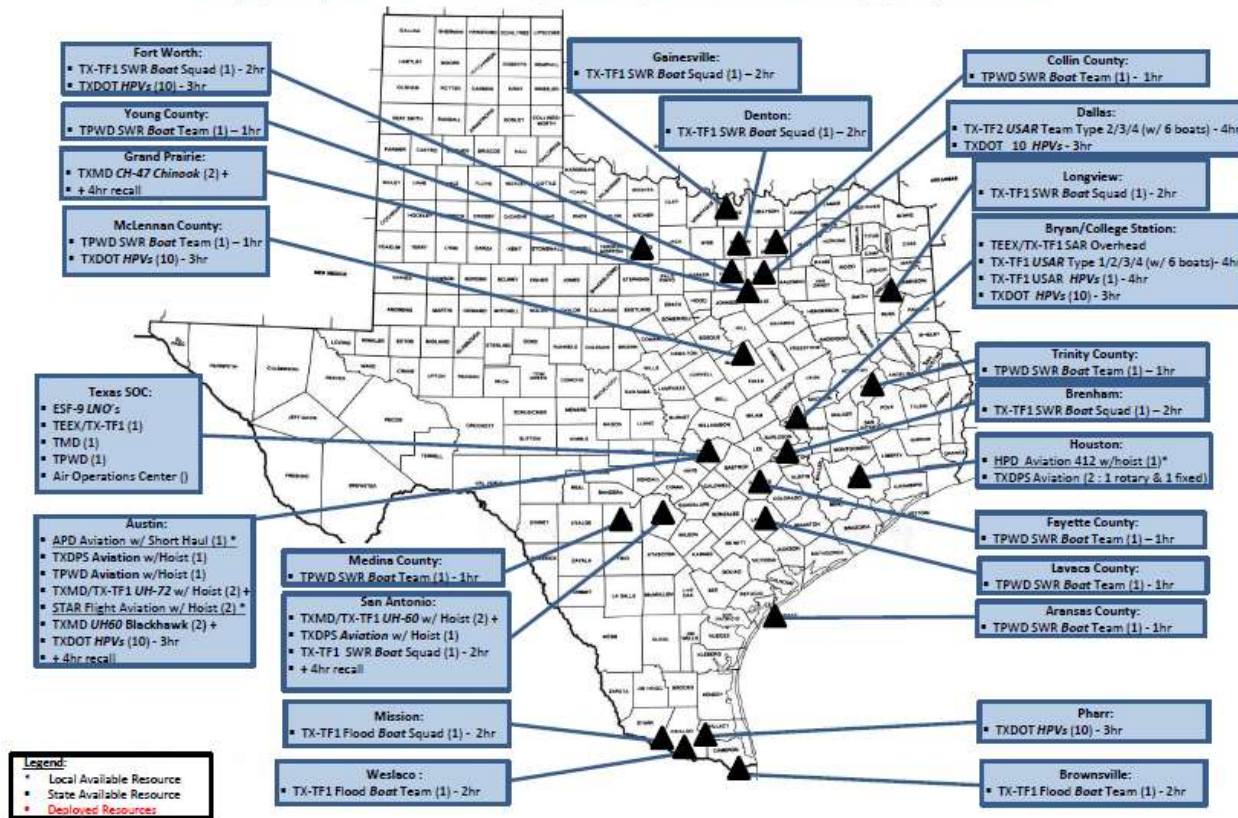
